CAN DEAD MEN REPENT

John 5:25 "Verily, verily, I say unto you, The hour is coming, and now is, when the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God: and they that hear shall live."

JESUS RAISED THE DEAD

We all are aware that physically dead people do not hear other human beings, who are sinners; however, we cannot bind the Lord Jesus Christ by such a standard. On at least three occasions during His earthly ministry Jesus raised the dead: Lazarus, Jairus' daughter, and the son of the widow of Nain. He spoke directly to the dead ones and they responded.

MEN TOLD TO DO THE IMPOSSIBLE

Once upon a Sabbath Day Jesus was in the synagogue and there was a man there with a withered hand. After some discussion with the Pharisees concerning healing on the Sabbath, Jesus told the man to do something that was quite impossible for him to do; just as impossible as telling a dead man to arise. Jesus told him to stretch forth his hand. If he could have stretched forth his hand he would certainly have done it before this occasion; however, when Christ speaks, the impossible becomes possible, and the man stretched forth his hand and "it was restored, whole as the other" (Matthew 12:13).

ALL ARE DEAD

"And you (hath he quickened), who were dead in trespasses and sins" (Eph. 2:1). "Hath he quickened" is in italics in the King James Bible; therefore, this phrase is not in the Greek. The New American Standard Bible says, "And you were dead in trespasses and sins" (Eph. 2:1). In either case the truth of the matter is that unsaved man is dead spiritually.

These elements are essential in a day of polished, wishy-washy, milk toast preachers who never ruffle any feathers.

The Extreme Middle

You are probably familiar with the terms "EXTREME LEFT" and "EXTREME RIGHT." But did you know that the most popular position in the religious world today is neither the "EXTREME LEFT" nor the "EXTREME RIGHT," but rather the "EXTREME MIDDLE?" Supposedly, this position avoids the extremes of both right and left and offers the best of both worlds. But is it Scriptural? Is it the position God wants His children to take?

Before answering these questions, it must be frankly admitted that the MIDDLE position does have a great appeal to the flesh. In the MIDDLE, you can wear almost any hat, sing almost any tune and preach almost any gospel. In the MIDDLE, you have the company of some of the best-known religious leaders of our day--men like Billy Graham, Bill Bright, Leighton Ford, David Hubbard, Robert Schuller, Jim Bakker, Pat Robertson, Oral Roberts, Rex Humbard, and others whose combined ministries influence the lives of millions of people. In the MIDDLE, there are many attractive programs--from mass evangelism to social and political action. There are more friends and fewer enemies. The world approves and applauds. It all sounds and feels so good, but...

THE BIBLE CLEARLY TEACHES that there is no MIDDLE ground in the battle between Christ and Satan, between believers and unbelievers, between truth and error (2 Corinthians 6:14-7:1). God commands His children to HAVE NO FELLOWSHIP with the unfruitful works of darkness (Ephesians 5:11) and to separate from "brethren who walk disorderly" (2 Thessalonians 3:6, 14-15). God's clear order is to SEPARATE. But the prevailing philosophy of our day is, "GET TOGETHER." Unity is valued above purity, fellowship above doctrine, love above truth. This MIDDLE position is EXTREMELY popular. People from all parts of the theological spectrum flock to its banners and march to its drums.

It is heartbreaking to see how many formerly conservative, fundamentalist leaders have forsaken the biblical teaching of separation and are joining hands in the MIDDLE with liberal ecumenists, charismatics and even Roman Catholics. The reasons given for this swing to the MIDDLE are equally as heartbreaking because they reflect a shift to the consideration of man's wisdom and perspective, instead of God's. A few of the most frequently heard reasons for this shift to the MIDDLE are as follows: (1) "We are tired of the battle between liberalism and fundamentalism. We want peace, not war." (2) "We have found that by not choosing sides, we can reach more people." (3) "We have discovered that there is not too much difference between fundamentalists and liberals--we simply haven't understood each other before." (4) "Separating from liberals in the church results in schism which is a greater sin than being in fellowship with those whose doctrine is in question." "Fundamentalists who separate from liberals lose their (Continued on page 12)





THE DOCTRINE OF SEPARATION:

Abraham and Separation - Genesis 12:1-3 Part V by Dr. Dayton Hobbs

As we saw before, God separated a seed, and gave him Isaac (Joshua 24:2,3). man, Noah, and his family unto along with pairs of all the creatures upon the earth. Having destroyed every living thing through a universal flood, He now commands Noah and his sons to "...be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish earth" (Gen. 9:1).

Abraham's Covenant

Now the Lord had said unto Abram, Get thee out of thy country, and from thy kindred, and from thy father's house, unto a land that I will shew thee: And I will make of thee a great nation, and I will bless thee, and make thy name great; and thou shalt be a blessing: And I will bless them that bless thee, and curse him that curseth thee: and in thee shall all families of the earth be blessed (Gen. 12:1-3).

As all separation involves "from" as well as "unto", we find this pattern clearly given to us in the Abrahamic Covenant. There are very clearly three areas of separation "from" that Abraham is responsible to obey as well as a clear "unto".

Separation "From"

1. In Abraham's case there was to be a clean break from the country of the Ur of the Chaldees. "Get thee out of thy country..." (Gen. 12:1). This is the land of his heathen fathers who were steeped in idolatry. Terah, Abraham's own father, was an idol worshipper as Joshua informs us.

And Joshua said unto all the people. Thus saith the Lord God of Israel, Your fathers dwelt on the other side of the flood in old time, even Terah, the father of Abraham, and the father of Nachor: and they served other gods. And I took your father Abraham from the other side of the flood, and led him throughout all the land of Canaan, and multiplied his

2. Abraham was also instructed to Himself, sparing them in the ark separate from his family. "...and from thy kindred..." (Genesis 12:1). As we are well aware, Abraham took Lot, his nephew, with him when he came into the land of Canaan (Genesis 12:4), which was in violation of God's the Covenant with Abraham, and proved to be destructive to Lot and his family. This failure likewise kept God from being able to bless Abraham as He desired until this relationship was resolved. The Scriptures prove to us over and over that the blessing of God in its fullness cannot rest upon an individual or a ministry as long as that individual or that ministry is in violation of God's principles of separation. Separation, the road to purity, and the favor of God go hand in hand in the Scripture and in daily practice.

> 3. The third area of Abraham's separation was to be: "...from thy father's house..." (Genesis 12:1). The Scriptures are clear in the New Testament that kinfolks can be a source of trouble for one set upon doing the will of God.

> Think not that I am come to send peace on earth: I came not to send peace, but a sword. For I am come to set a man at variance against his father, and the daughter against her mother, and the daughter in law against her mother in law. And a man's foes shall be they of his own household. He that loveth father or mother more than me is not worthy of me: and he that loveth son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me. And he that taketh not his cross, and followeth after me, is not worthy of me. He that findeth his life shall lose it: and he that loseth his life for my sake shall find it (Matt. 10:34-39).

> While he yet talked to the people. behold, his mother and his brethren stood without, desiring to speak with him.

Then one said unto him, Behold, thy mother and thy brethren stand without, desiring to speak with thee. But he answered and said unto him that told him, Who is my mother? and who are my brethren? And he stretched forth his hand toward his disciples, and said, Behold my mother and my brethren! For whosoever shall do the will of my Father which is in heaven, the same is my brother, and sister, and mother. (Matt. 12:46-50).

For God's complete blessing to be given to Abraham, he had to be in full compliance with the conditions God had laid out for him in the promised convenant before he had left Ur of the Chaldees.

Separation "Unto"

Genesis 12:1 "...unto a land that I will shew thee." Abraham is to be the father of a new people, a special people, chosen of God to be the people of God's own heritage. This new people, the Jews, were to be given a special land; however, before this promise could be realized there had to be a complete separation by Abraham from his entire past: his country, his kindred, and the house of his father.

Completion of the Requirements

And the Lord said unto Abram, after that Lot was separated from him, Lift up now thine eyes, and look from the place where thou art northward. southward, and eastward, and westward: For all the land which thou seest, to thee will I give it, and to thy seed for ever. And I will make thy seed as the dust of the earth: so that if a man can number the dust of the earth, then shall thy seed also be numbered. Arise, walk through the land in the length of it and in the breadth of it; for I will give it unto thee. Then Abram removed his tent, and came and dwelt in the plain of Mamre, which is in Hebron, and built there an altar unto the LORD (Genesis 13:14-18).

God is now able to restate His promise to Abraham after Lot is separated from Abraham.

For the first time in Isaiah's young life the throne of Judah was vacant. King Uzziah, the man, who had symbolized national order and authority, had passed away. Then Isaiah saw the THRONE, which is never vacant; then he saw the KING, the LORD, who never dies; and then he heard and witnessed the sounds of HEAVEN, that never cease - the seraphim crying out in thresholdshaking tones the holiness of God.

The Holiness of God is stunning, but ever practical. Holiness is complete and total separation from impurity and defilement unto that which is pure and right. The truth of God's holiness is the foundation of all Biblical revelation. When Isaiah captured a glimpse of God's glory, he was reminded that God is still on the throne, and He is high and lifted up. The view of the seraphim searching the holiness of God was transforming. seen God" (Judges 13:22). God revealed Himself to Isaiah, and Isaiah came away humbled. Isaiah learned that day that you cannot rush into the presence of a Holy God. Isaiah 6 forever shows us that a service unto the Lord, must be preceded by a REDUCING and a CLEANSING.

A Reducing

Isaiah 6:5 - Then said I, Woe is me! For I am undone; because I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips: for mine eyes have seen the King, the LORD of hosts.

I cannot imagine the terror that Jesus there on the Isle of Patmos and cannot see God without suffering death to sin and self. Isaiah's vision of the glory and holiness of God had reduced him in his own estimation to the level of his guilty and defiled nation. Sensing our sinfulness before God is a reality check that every believer needs to know.

Prov. 3:5 - "Trust in the Gord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding."

The word "trust" is from a Hebrew word meaning to flee for refuge; to flee for protection. So to trust is to move from a place of danger to a place of safety. Trust indicates an urgency of action. It is not something to be put off, for time is wasting and danger is increasing as time presses on.

Isn't this ever true in life as time marches on and you are not saved? Do not the ones who go through life without the Lord Jesus Christ as Savior continually head toward the abyss? Did not the Lord Jesus Christ say that the plucking out of your right eye or the cutting off your right hand was less of a loss than your whole body being cast into hell?

This Proverbs father is serious about this instruction. Trust in the Lord, Son! Flee from danger to a place of safety, and the Word tells you where to find that safety. The father is as quick to instruct as he wants his son to be quick to trust. There is no quandary here or consideration of various options. No! The father tells his son there is only one place to find refuge, and that place is in the Lord.

This is where faith comes in. Faith accepts the source of that refuge and protection. By faith I am persuaded that only in the Lord is the place of refuge and protection. My mind assents to this. Faith then is the engine that causes the movement required in trust.

The Old Testament Scriptures present incident after incident of this kind of trust, and it is always described as escape from *many* places of danger to *one* place of refuge. David spoke of this trust in II Sam 22: 2, 3, The LORD is my rock, and my fortress, and my deliverer; in him will I trust: he is my shield, and the horn of my salvation, my high tower, and my refuge, my saviour.

My first engineering job was that of a railroad bridge designer. I did not begin to design bridges the first day, because I did not know how to design a bridge. You might ask, "How did you get your engineering degree if you didn't know how to design a railroad bridge?" Well, I learned the same things that all college students learn, simply the tools of the trade. I didn't know much that was practical! After college is when you learn the application of the tools of the trade, and most times that is learned on the job. So the first few months I was assigned portions of designs so I could learn the

components of bridge building. Eventually, by these experiences, I learned to design a complete bridge. The time came when I was given the task of designing an entire bridge, and I applied the things I learned in college.

My boss exercised a limited faith in me, knowing that experienced bridge designers would check my work. I worked diligently on that bridge with the understanding that if I wanted to design greater bridges I must perform well on little bridges. The bridge was eventually built somewhere in Louisanna.

But the highlight of my bridge design career was when the grizzled old bridge builder foreman called the office and complimented the design, telling my boss that all the components had fit well, and he was proud of the finished product. This was not a normal thing for a foreman to be passing out compliments, especially to engineers. This bridge foreman communicated his faith in the bridge he had built and that I had designed. He knew good bridges when he saw one, and he said he saw one in this bridge. But what would my boss have said if the bridge builder had not wanted to take a locomotive with all its heavy cars across the bridge? demonstrated that his faith in that bridge was true faith? Why, it was his willingness to cross the bridge with the heaviest load the railroad permitted and to know that that bridge would do its job. That faith was a true faith that caused movement of the gigantic locomotive across the bridge.

Having faith in the bridge designer, the bridge builder, and the bridge materials used will lead to faith in the bridge, but unless that faith persuades you to be on the heaviest train to cross that bridge it is worthless. You may say that you have faith, but if that faith does not lead to trusting you might as well throw out that kind of faith.

If the train never crosses the bridge, that bridge might as well be dismantled and sold for scrap! The bridge is useless! If your faith never leads you to the place of refuge that the Lord provides, your faith is vain. Faith that never leads you to rely on the Lord in all your ways is useless, for it accomplishes nothing. Faith must bring trust if God is to accomplish anything in your life. God has a plan for you but it requires crossing the bridge. Ω

GOD COMMANDS DEAD MEN TO REPENT

The problem is not that sinners can't repent, the problem is that they *will* not. Acts 17:30-"And the times of this ignorance (that the Godhead is like unto gold, or silver, or stone) God winked at; but <u>now</u> commandeth <u>all</u> <u>men</u> every where to repent."

I suppose this is about as universal a statement as could be made. The command is to ALL MEN EVERY WHERE. Notice also that this is a command, putting God's power behind it. "Back of God's commands He puts Omnipotence" (Dr. Bob Jones, Sr.). We can do what God commands us to do, and, therefore, men who are dead in trespasses and sins can repent. "But", someone says, "How can a man that is dead in trespasses and sins do something that obviously requires life to do?" I don't claim to know the answer to that question, but I do know the answer to this one: Can a man who is dead in trespasses and sins repent? The answer is "Yes"; because God has commanded him to repent. After Peter visited the Gentile Cornelius' house in Acts 10, he had to give the Jews of Jerusalem an account of the visit and the results. In Acts 11:18b these Jews had to admit that God had, in fact, visited the Gentiles: "Then hath God also to the Gentiles granted repentance unto life." Notice the order: repentance unto life. He didn't give them life so they could repent and believe.

OUR RESPONSIBILITY--REPENT

Jesus, in Luke 18, tells us of the publican who prayed, smiting his breast, "God be merciful to me a sinner," and that he went home justified. The first instruction to give an unrepentant sinner is to "repent." This is where it all begins! Ω

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Teaching Tips OF THE TOTAL PERPORT OF THE

Communication Skills

Parents do not like surprises. They want their child's teacher to be open and frank about classroom procedures, requirements, and discipline. Teachers do not like surprises, either. They want their pupils' parents to be open and frank about issues at home which may affect the child's performance at school. The goal of both groups in a Christian school is to give the child a quality Christian education. Communication is the answer. We can accomplish this only when teachers and parents work together. While much effort is given to this type of communication on the elementary level, middle school and high school level students need to have these issues addressed as well.

Classroom procedures are primarily taught during the first few days of school. When the teacher is consistent, students will be able to navigate their day with ease and security. Teachers should be very cautious about varying classroom procedures after they have been set. A so-called "glorified rut" is a good thing for students. Classroom procedures that should be addressed are seating assignments, paper headings, the order of the passing in of papers, and how oral answers are to be given.

Class requirements should be well thought out before the school year begins. The administration is primarily responsible to see that all courses are taught and covered properly. A teacher's lesson plan is certainly one way to make sure the academic workload is covered. A good way to keep parents informed is to print a handout sheet with course requirements and due dates. This will help parents see that their child learns to budget his/her time in order to complete assignments on time.

Classroom discipline is also set by the administration; however, it is the teacher's responsibility to see that discipline procedures are carried out. In a sense, teachers should learn to "skin their own skunks." This means that every teacher should be able to control his/her own students. Of course, the administration is there to back up the teacher, but the teacher must be able to maintain the discipline standards of the school. This will often require communication with the parent.

Most parents want their children's teachers to keep them informed. They want to know their child's progress or lack of progress. They want to also be kept informed of their child's behavior and deportment in class. Generally speaking, it is fine to put good reports in a short note, but bad news is best delivered personally. Teachers walk a fine line here. Parents do not want to be "hounded" or harassed, but they do want to be kept up-to-date.

Christian schoolteachers should be conscious of the inner-workings of a Christian home. They must understand that although school is an important part of a child's life, it is not the only part. The parents are responsible that their children develop spiritually, socially, physically, as well as academically. When all these parts are given their rightful place, the child is happy and well adjusted.

Teachers should be mindful of the amount of homework they assign. Too much homework is not necessary or good for children's development. If we work our students well during our class periods, they should have free time to play sports, attend extra-curricular activities, attend mid-week Church services, and even have free time to play each evening. The purpose of homework is to reinforce skills and concepts learned in school. One and one-half to two hours of homework should be the maximum on a high school level. If a child has several classes, the teachers should divide the time up so that no particular course monopolizes all of a child's homework time.

Parents should also be mindful that teachers need to be informed about certain issues that may affect their child's performance at school. Teachers want to be able to pray for the family needs of each of their pupils.

Since nobody likes surprises, it is important that teachers and parents have a good working relationship. When both the teacher and the parent are easy to approach, the child will have a successful year. Good communication skills are necessary for teachers who have a heart for every child. Ω

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immediately. Isaiah was not deserving of God's favor. He had not earned nor purchased this divine favor. The grace was bestowed on the basis of substitution. The altar obviously reveals the abiding principle of sacrifice, the vicarious shedding of blood for the remission of sins, whereby a just and righteous God extends the pardon of grace to repentant men. Praise and thanksgiving be unto the Lord Jesus Christ for His substitutionary death, burial, and resurrection, whereby the grace of God was revealed to us as lost sinners.

The Calling and Charge of Isaiah

Isaiah 6:8--13 Also I heard the voice of the Lord, saying, Whom shall I send, and who will go for us? Then said I, Here am I; send me. And he said, Go, and tell this people, Hear ye indeed, but understand not; and see ye indeed, but perceive not. Make the heart of this people fat, and make their ears heavy, and shut their eyes; lest they see with their eyes, and hear with their ears, and understand with their heart, and convert, and be healed. Then said I, Lord, how long? And he answered, Until the cities be wasted without inhabitant, and the houses without man, and the land be utterly desolate. And the LORD have removed men far away, and there be a great forsaking in the midst of the land. But yet in it shall be a tenth, and it shall return, and shall be eaten: as a teil tree, and as an oak, whose substance is in them, when they cast their leaves: so the holy seed shall be the substance thereof.

Up to this point it has been the voices of seraphims piercing the ears of Isaiah. Now the Lord Himself speaks. "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Isaiah volunteers to be God's servant and messenger. What message shall he bring? Is it to be one of triumph and victory? Is it to be one accepted by a multitude of hearers? No, it is to be just the opposite. "And he said, Go, and tell this people, Hear ye indeed, but understand not; and see ye indeed, but perceive not" (Vs. 9).

Their eyes were blinded, their ears would not hear, and their heart was hardened. Isaiah said, "Lord, how long?" Verses 11-12 indicate that his ministry was to continue until the promised judgment came.

What an unusual but sad assignment! His charge was to bear a message of judgment and sorrow to his people. It takes a consecrated man to take such a tragic message. Let us consider this truth. Nowhere in Scriptures are we told that this world will be swept into the kingdom of Jesus Christ. Never will there be a time when those who preach the gospel of Christ will be able to convert the whole earth. The world is becoming increasingly more violent and wicked, filled with war, bloodshed and disease. Yet this glorious hope prevails, Jesus Christ is the future. Isaiah Chapter 7 would hail the beginning of the great message of the coming Saviour, "...a virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel".

The call of God upon Isaiah came upon the heels of his reduction and cleansing. Man's way is to climb on top of others to reach to new heights in society. God's way is to humble man by observing His purity and righteousness and then thoroughly
