WHAT'S WRONG WITH POSTMILLENNIALISM?

Part 1

Just a few years ago many premillennial theologians and preachers were announcing the death of postmillennialism. World wars, economic depressions, and ecumenical liberalism all argued strongly against the idea of a golden age on earth ushered in by the efforts of man, albeit under the power of God. Even the prominent scholar, J. Dwight Pentecost wrote in his book, Things To Come, "Postmillennialism finds no defenders or advocates in the present chiliastic discussions within the theological world."

Postmillennial thought and doctrine are not dead, but alive and well and flourishing within fundamentalist and evangelical communities. Some men like Rousas J. Rushdoony openly preach anti-chiliasm while others, many of them claiming to be premillennialists, obviously share the postmillennial dream of a golden age of Christianity as they set out to save America

or cure society's ills.

A person's eschatology is basic to one's philosophy of life and present manner of living. Faulty eschatology lends itself to a faulty practice of Christianity. The Apostle Paul directly connected the living of a righteous and godly life with the looking for that "blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of Jesus Christ" (Titus 2:12-13). What a person believes about the millennium is therefore all important. It dictates what a man believes his responsibilities are as a Christian individual, what the role of the church is in this present age, where to expend energies and talents, what problems to attempt to correct, and ultimately where to place hope.

Doctrinal Development of Chiliasm

A working knowledge of the develop-

Postmillennialism is on the rise in Fundamentalist circles. If you were to ask the average pastor what his position or the position of his church is as regards the millennium, he would likely say that it is pre-millennial, but if you were to observe the day-to-day practice of that church or individual pastor, you might be surprised to find practical postmillennialism at work.

The average church today, I fear, is not waiting expectantly for her Lord's return. The "blessed hope" has been replaced by human effort to fix up a decayed society; by pastors and laymen alike working more at repairing breaches than Tooking heavenward. No longer need we be concerned for fear of being "so heavenly minded that we are no earthly good", for our problem is being "so earthly minded we are no

heavenly good".

The "blessed hope" of the Church is not the salvation of society; it is not even the establishing of the Kingdom of God on earth. The "blessed hope" of the church is the return of her risen Lord; her heavenly Bridegroom in the air to rapture her to be with Him throughout the

ages of eternity.

When our attention is involved more with the condition of things on earth rather than our Lord's imminent return to earth, we are, in fact, Postmillennialists in practice. It is to them that "look for Him" that He is to "appear the second time without sin unto salvation" (Hebrews 9:28).

Fulfilling one's individual responsibility as a citizen is one thing; putting time, money and effort to fix up this world is not the responsibility of the Christian. The mission we have been given is that of the calling out of a "people for His name." When that body is complete, our Lord will return for His body, the Church. Let us not be sidetracked from our heavenly calling.

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
Tee Ball Morld Series 1983

Nineteen teams of youngsters, ages 5-7, along with their managers coaches, parents, relatives, friends, and others interested in the sports program converged on Santa Rosa Christian School's Ball Park for the 1983 Tee Ball World Series, June 24-30. Much work and thought goes into the Tee Ball Program each year, but it has proved to be an excellent tool in training physical ability, building character, and presenting the Gospel to many youngsters. Each franchised league has four to six teams in it. Teams for the World

Series are made up of All-Star players chosen from those leagues. A total of 37 games completes the tournament brackets over six days of play. HOBBS' INVENTION SPAWNS TEE BALL WORLD SERIES

The annual Tee Ball World Series closed out its 13th year Thursday evening at the Gospel Projects complex at Santa Rosa Christian School in Milton.

Dr. Dayton Hobbs, founder of the institution 31 years ago, sat in the stands, viewing the vast athletic complex at the school and watching the youngsters exhibit their skills on the diamond.

As he watched, Hobbs recalled many fond memories of the past, his affiliation with the school, and the birth of Tee Ball.

"You were here in 1971 for the Dixie Youth State Championships, if I recall," he said. "As you can see,

we've grown some since then. In fact, we're about to add another baseball field here. That will give us five."

But on this hot summer evening, Tee Ball was the name of the game, a sport created here in 1960.

"We started Tee Ball back then in Bagdad," Hobbs said. "We wanted to come up with some type of program for younger boys, in an effort to keep them interested in baseball, because they were too young to play in Dixie Youth baseball. So Tee Ball really got going. The managers had a lot of fun, the parents liked it, so the next year we advanced a little bit and chose up teams. The next year we put down some rules. It was obvious by then that we had to make some changes.'

From that point, many of opposing teams in the Dixie Youth program learned of the Tee Ball growth in Milton and requested that officials from the Santa Rosa School "come over and explain things about Tee

Ball." "We traveled around the country to a lot of different places explaining the game." said Hobbs. "Well, it just kept growing until, in 1970, we had our first Tee Ball World Series. We had the game patented and we have the name 'Tee Ball Baseball' as well. We print the rule book here and send it out all over the United States. Of course there are a lot of people playing it now that do not franchise with us, but they play the game and that's our primary concern. We had a lot of Navy people that helped us and they traveled all over the country, taking the game with them and started it in other programs, so it has really spread."

The Tee Ball World Series is but the beginning of post-season play in youth baseball circles, but it

"That's interesting that you would think that, Betsy. (Acts 16:29)

Hobbs feels athletics, in relation to a Christian experience, plays a most important role in preparing the youngster for a mature adult Christian life.

"I've been pastoring here for 31 years," he said. "We started this ministry 31 years ago this August. Most all of those years I have been working with young people in sports. We started the church league here in 1958, before we got to the Dixie Youth program. To me, athletics is very important, because you can teach Christian values, character building better on the athletic field than you can about anywhere else. The weakness in a fellow's character is going to come out on the ball field, whether he doesn't hustle, has a bad temper, or whatever it is, it's going to show up, especially as the competition gets tighter. This is what I do it for, the entire reason we are in it. I feel like it's a very important part. And I also think there is a move in some churches to de-emphasize winning. I don't believe in cheating or cutting corners to win, but I believe that teaching a kid to win is a very basic part of life, very important. I feel very strongly about that at the age of Tee Ball. You have to be very careful about winning, putting too much pressure on the kids. You're primarily teaching a winning attitude."

The kids in this year's Tee Ball World Series definitely had a winning attitude. But, they had something else. Outstanding sportsmanship. Just like Hobbs said.

A dream of 22 years ago, to develop a program for the younger kids, has become a reality for Dr. Dayton Hobbs. The dream was an outstanding exhibition of athletic competition this week during the Tee Ball World Series.

No one can be generously educated and understanding without being able to be a good listener. We are to be teachable more than talkative. Solomon made the observation that: "he that hath knowledge spareth his words: and a man of understanding is of an excellent spirit. Even a fool, when he holdeth his peace, is counted wise: and he that shutteth his lips is esteemed a man of understanding" (Proverbs 17:27-28).

TO THINK CLEARLY

To think at all is one of life's deepest disciplines. To think clearly should be the evidence of an educated person. With perspicacity and penetration, with reason and reasonableness, with common sense and caution, with instruction and insight, he should be well advised and not worldly wise. With observation and objectivity he can sift evidence from opinions, proof from propaganda, and with good judgment he can weigh evidence. He has foresight, and is also taught by hindsight, and should be free from folly and frivolity. To every problem there is an answer, and by diligent observation and



logical thinking he proceeds toward the solution thereof.

TO SPEAK AND TO WRITE ACCURATELY

An educated person should be concise and not clumsy, precise and not ponderous. Good grammar is a godsend to him and correct spelling is evidence of his education. He has both clarity of thought and felicity of expression so as to communicate cogently and not to confuse himself or others. To be effective in communicating to others, he is unaffected and unostentatious.

TO READ WIDELY

It was Sir Francis Bacon who wrote: "Reading maketh a full man, conference a ready man, and writing an exact man." He added: "Read not to contradict, nor to believe, but to weigh and to consider." To be educated is to be interested, inquisitive, industrious, informed. It is to be intrigued with learning, to be independent of the opinions of others and vet not to be opinionated. It is to be eager and earnest in the pursuit of knowledge, and never idle. College years should be but the beginning of a lifetime of learning. Sometimes that is not the case. One should heed the warning given by the great lexicographer, Samuel Johnson, who said: "In my early years I read very hard. It is a sad reflection, but a true one, that I knew almost as much at eighteen as I do now."

TO LIVE HONESTLY AND HEARTILY

While preparing for life during college years, one should not forget to live! Education should cultivate integrity and uprightness, probity and high principles. One is to be both trustful and trustworthy, open-minded and open-hearted, courageous and constant, conscientious and consistent. 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
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TO MOVE PURPOSEFULLY AND PRAYERFULLY

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Morld Congress of Fundamentalists - 1983

Theme - "The Authority of Scripture"

The World Congress of Fundamentalists, sponsored by the International Committee for the Propagation and Defense of Biblical Fundamentalism, is scheduled to be held this August 1-7 at Bob Jones University in Greenville, South Carolina. Previous congresses have met in Edinburgh, Manila, and Singapore.

Delegates from throughout the world will receive pertinent information through panels, seminars, and preaching services which promise to cover nearly every aspect of Christian life. Since the meetings are not intended only for pastors and Christian workers, but are geared for the whole congregation, groups of church members are

urged to attend.

One of the many emphases for this Congress will be Christian education. The philosophy of Christian education will be the theme of a seminar which will meet every afternoon. Thursday morning a panel discussion will be held under the direction of Dr. Clinton Branine of Indiana Baptist College in Indianapolis. Panelists will include Dr. Joseph A. Rammel of Pillsbury Baptist Bible College in Owatonna, Minnesota, who will discuss the authority of Scripture in Christian education. Dr. O. ment or the chiliastic or millennial doctrine is essential. What a disadvantage to tackle the millennial issue without an understanding of what has gone on before! A person better be somewhat careful about waving a flag simply because he is attracted to its colors or finds it convenient or popular to do. Where did the flag come from and what does it represent? The past of the flag gives meaning to its present and determines its future. So it is with the flag of postmillennialism.

It is important to realize that for the first 250 years of the Church, believers universally embraced what we now call premillennialism. God's people interpreted scripture literally and, on the face value of God's Word, believed in the personal, any moment return of Jesus Christ to rapture the saints. They believed Paul's words concerning a worsening apostasy and looked to Jesus Christ as the "blessed hope." They believed also in the personal reign of Christ on earth following His Second Coming. His rule of righteousness with a rod of iron would last a thousand years.

Men are free to believe and follow systems of eschatology other than premillennialism, but those who do should understand they are departing from the historical mooring of the early Church. They must be prepared to boldly declare that concerning Christ's return, Christians were wrong, believed erroneously and held to a false hope for the first two centuries of the Church's existence.

Amillennialism did not come on the scene until around 400 A.D. There are two key men in history responsible for the construction of this false system of eschatology. Origen (185-254 AD) paved the way by being the first major theologian to attack the literal interpretation of scripture. Augustine (354-430 AD) built upon this non-literal basis of interpretation to spiritualize his way to the development of amillennialism (no millennium). Pentecost writes in Things To Come, "While Origen laid the foundation in establishing the non-literal method of interpretation, it was Augustine who systematized the non-literal view of the millennium into what is now know as Amillennialism.

The emerging Roman Catholic Church then accepted Augustine's eschatology and thus amillennialism became the prevailing view of the nominal church through the Dark Ages. Sadly, the Protestant Reformers also retained Augustine's amillennial eschatology. Amillennialism

remains firmly entrenched in the major Protestant denominations today

Postmillennialism appears to have been developed into a system by a Unitarian by the name of Daniel Whitby (1638-1726). Postmillennialism is in fact like amillennialism in that it is anti-chiliastic. The golden age of postmillennium is a far cry from the millennium of early Bible believers. Literal interpretation of the Bible is rejected and men are freed to pursue their hopes and dreams of a utopia on earth resulting from human efforts blessed by God.

children. Children are always under the authority of another, whether it be the children of God, as all believers are, or the children of men.

DISCIPLINE IS GOD'S TRAINING METHOD

Discipline is the training method God uses on all His children. Every son He receives He disciplines because He loves him and desires him to be a partaker of His holiness. Love is the only legitimate reason for exercising discipline. Children who are loved, in the scriptural understanding of the word "love", are disciplined or trained by those responsible for them. To be undisciplined then is to be illegitimate from God's point of view.

FOUR WAYS GOD DISCIPLINES

We will look at four scriptural ways that God takes care of this very important matter of the discipline of His children.

The Word of God

All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness.

II Timothy 3:16

For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart.

Neither is there any creature that is not manifest in his sight: but all things are naked and opened unto the eyes of him with whom we have to do. Hebrews 4:12-13

I believe God's primary resource for the training or discipline of His children is His Word. If we are responsive to His written Word, following its instruction in full obedience as the Holy Spirit gives us understanding, we will probably need very little else in the way of discipline. Our desire for our own children should be immediate "voice obedience", that is, prompt response to our voice commands to them in the right spirit. Our hearts should desire to please our Lord and to respond immediately to His expressed instruction to us.

The Knife

Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away: and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit. John 15:2

Those who are familiar with the growing of plants, trees, or vines

are very familiar with probably the most important devise a gardener possesses--his pruning shears. Most successful gardeners carry them with them constantly. One well known gardening company recommends in their instructions of pruning that if you are not sure whether to cut a particular growth or not--cut! I am not so sure that is always good advise but it is certainly true that most pruners prune too little rather than too much. God knows all about pruning: He knows how much to prune, where to prune, and when to prune so far as His children are concerned, and He always accomplishes what He desires in our lives with His pruning knife. We may wonder at the time of cutting, but we know that He knows best and looking back at a later time we see the fruit produced by His wise and timely pruning.

The Thorn

And lest I should be exalted above measure through the abundance of the revelations, there was given to me a thorn in the flesh, the messenger of Satan to buffet me, lest I should be exalted above measure.

For this thing I besought the Lord thrice, that it might depart from me.

And he said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness. Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me.

II Corinthians 12:7-9

In Paul's case, on one occassion God used a thorn in the flesh to keep Paul from being "exalted above measure". This discipline measure seems to be reserved for those who have been signally used of God, and for the purpose of maintaining humility lest reward should be lost. This infirmity brought about weakness in order that glory may be brought to God, and that the power of Christ may rest upon the recipient of the thorn. Would that we could be counted worthy of this form of discipline from the hand of God.

The Rod

And ye have forgotten the exhortation which speaketh unto you as unto children, My son, despise not thou the chastening of the Lord, nor faint when thou art rebuked of him:

For whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom he receiveth. Hebrews 12:5-6

To "scourge" means to whip or to flog. It is used concerning the beating that Pilate had administered to Jesus, and of Jewish scourgings (Matt. 10:17; 23:34). In the Old Testament God speaks of using the "rod of men" to chastise David's seed (II Sam. 7:14). The rod generally speaks of authority administered to bring about correction, and God may use a loving hand, as of a parent, or an enemy, as in the case of Israel, but for God's children His purpose is always for their good.

There are lessons for those of us involved in and concerned about the training of children in the methods God uses for our discipline. Let us examine them carefully and profit thereby.
