PUBLIC SCHOOLS

PART 2

The Gannett News Service recently published a series of articles in which they reported that enrollment in Fundamentalist private schools is up 118% over the last decade, while enrollment in public and Roman Catholic schools is on the decline by 11.7% and 21.7% respectively. Last month in the column, "The Other Side," we looked into some aspects of these revealing statistics. Our purpose is two-fold. We, as Chris-



tian educators, should know why these things have taken place, and also we should see these statistics as a warning to Christian schools, lest we adopt public school methods and materials and follow them down the road of decay.

TITLE I

In an effort to completely con-

trol the educational process in the public schools, the federal government finances a program which is named after the law which funds it. Title I costs the taxpayers nearly \$3.4 billion annually. The purpose of the program is to provide special classes for certain children within the school system. These special classes could be for the exceptionally bright students as well as the slow students; the musical and the "educationally disadvantaged" also qualify. As a matter of fact, it seems that as long as money is available to a school district under Title I, somebody will come up with some-thing "appropriate" to teach, lest the money be spent in the next county instead!

Others May - You Cannot

Others may be allowed to succeed in making money, or may have a legacy left to them, but it is likely God will keep you poor, because He wants you to have something far better than gold, namely, a helpless dependence on Him, that He may have the privilege of supplying your needs day by day out of an unseen treasury.

The Lord may let others be honored and put forward, and keep you hidden in obscurity, because He wants you to produce some choice, fragrant fruit for His coming glory, which can only be produced in the shade. He may let others be great, but keep you small. He may let others do a great work for Him and get the credit of it, but He will make you work and toil on without knowing how much you are doing; and then to make your work still more precious, He may let others get the credit for the work which you have done, and thus make your reward ten times greater when Jesus comes.

The Holy Spirit will put a strict watch over you, with a jealous love, and will rebuke you for little words and feelings, or for wasting time, which other Christians never seem distressed over. So make up your mind that God is an infinite Sovereign, and has the right to do as He pleases with His own. He may not explain to you a thousand things which puzzle your reason in His dealings with you, but if you absolutely sell yourself to be His love slave, He will wrap you up in a jealous love, and bestow upon you many blessings which come only to those who are in the inner circle.

Concerning Governmental Authority

Governmental authority is appointed and ordained by God as a rod of His anger for the discipline and punishment of the evil and profligate nation (Isaiah 10:5-15). Therefore doth Paul name it a servant of God's vengeance (Romans 13:4), by means of which God will avenge Himself on their sins and bring the evil they have done upon their own head, that their wickedness might not continue to spread and that the whole earth might not on their account become blemished and unclean (Genesis 9:1-6). Therefore one should be obedient and subject to rulers as ordained by God for the purpose of protection (Romans 13:1-7), in so far as they do not attack the conscience or command what is against God. As Peter exhorteth us saving, "Submit yourselves to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake: whether it be to the king, as supreme; or unto the governors, as unto them that are sent by Him" (I Peter 2:13-17). And Paul saith, "Remind them to be subject to the principalities and powers, to obey magistrates, to be ready to every good work"

Therefore is one rightly obedient and subject

to them, and the more diligent one is therein, the better is it and the more pleasing to God. For whosoever resisteth this, resisteth the ordinance of God (Romans 13:1-2). Where, however, the rulers command and act against God, there one must leave their command undone, and obey God rather than man (Acts 5:29). For the conscience hath been set free and is reserved for God alone, that He and no human being may be Lord of the same and rule over, teach and direct it whithersoever it pleaseth Him.

Therefore wherever the government presumeth to lay hands upon the conscience and to control the faith of man, there it is robbing God of what is His. Therefore it is wrong to obey it in this (Romans 2:14-24).

Now, since the office of government is an ordinance and establishment of God and because it hath been appointed and ordained by God, within its own limits it is right and good, but where it is abused, this same misuse is wrong.

Will A Man Rob God?

Malachi 3:8

This is a startling question. The prophet Malachi seems to be gripping his listless people by the shoulders in an effort to shake them into wakefulness. Therefore, he flings at them these arresting words: "Will a man rob God?" Will he? I know that there are those who will steal from the city that elected them to positions of trust. There are brothers that will rob brothers. There are parents that will steal from their own children, and children that will steal from their parents. But will a man rob God? When we rob each other, we feel that there is a chance that our dishonesty may never be detected. But this cannot be the case when we rob Him in whose hand our breath is and Who knows all our ways. How, then, shall we answer this question?

Our first impulse is to give an emphatic No. No man would be so mad as to rob God. But when we face the facts we find that we are wrong. Men will rob God. There were such in the days of the prophet Malachi. "Ye have robbed me," he declares, speaking for God. Those so accused were indignant. "You have flung at us a horrible accusation," they reply. "Prove it. Cite instances. Tell us wherein we have robbed God." "You ask me to be specific," he replies. "All right, I will. You have robbed God in tithes and offerings. By withholding your tithes you have cheated God His just dues." This fact is so plain that it is impossible to fail to understand it.

How had these people come to be guilty of robbing God? They could not plead ignorance. They had known from their infancy that the tenth of all their increase belonged to God. They could not plead poverty. The truth of the matter is, it is far easier to induce those with small incomes to tithe than those whose incomes are large. Somehow, as our incomes increase, we fail to be impressed by the increase of the 9/10th. We are only impressed by the increase of the 1/10th.

No more had these people ceased to tithe because they had left religion altogether. They still attended church. They still gave after a fashion. But their gifts were small and cheap. Why was this the case? Because they had lost all sense of God's love. Love delights to give. It is heartbroken when it cannot give. But when love dies, we give as little as

NO SUBSTITUTE FOR PRAYER

THE MORAL MAJORITY??

A new religious-political organization known as the "Moral Majority" is sweeping the country, gaining acceptance and popularity in conservative circles. The movement, led by Dr. Jerry Falwell, is purposed to unite the supposedly 80 million fundamental Christians in America into a "national political force." According to Dr. Falwell, "Fundamental Christians can run America." (BLU-PRINT 4-29-80).

True Fundamentalists must avoid the "Moral Majority" movement like the plague. To be sure, all Christians are sickened by the immorality of our society. However, spiritual compromise and carnal weaponry are not the vehicles to revival and social change. Separated believers need to be aware of several facts concerning the "Moral Majority" movement:

1. There is no such thing as a moral majority in America. The 80 million American fundamentalists are a figment of Falwell's wild imagination. In a recent meeting with Israeli Prime Minister Menachem Begin at the Blair House, Falwell boasted.

The vast majority of quoteunquote Christians in America are evangelical. Our members far exceed the more liberal National Council of Churches... (Moral Majority Report, 5-1-80).

Falwell's fundamentalists include everyone remotely tainted with the evangelical cause. His claim is fraudulent and deceptive—to the point of being an outright lie. Dr. Jasmin is undoubtedly correct when he states,

The 80 million "fundamentalist" Christians are actually a composite of ecumenicists, religious apostates, fundamentalists, Roman Catholics, cultists, and nearly every kind of religious hodgepodge conceivable. (Voice of Fundamentalism, May-June, 1980).

2. The ecumenicalism of the Moral Majority will do more damage to America than her immorality. God has never used a majority to accomplish His work or to bring revival. God blesses the purity of

a few, not the political power of the many. Morality is the result of the new birth in the hearts of individuals. Morality cannot be legislated from the halls of Congress.

God would have spared Sodom for a few righteous souls. Gideon defeated the Midianites with a handful of dedicated soldiers. David was a majority of one when he toppled the Philistine giant. The battle is the Lord's, not Jerry Falwell's. It will be won by the power of God, not the strength of man. Our power is in our purity. Ecumenicalism will destroy our purity.

The May 1, 1980 edition of the Moral Majority Report pictures Dr. Falwell and his "powerful" companions who met with Begin at the Blair House. They include: Dr. Adrian Rogers, president of the Southern Baptist Convention; Dr. James Kennedy, pastor of the Coral Ridge Presbyterian Church in Fort Lauderdale, Florida; Dr. Greg Dixon, pastor of the Indianapolis Baptist Temple; Dr. Wendell Zimmerman, of the Baptist Bible Tribune; and Dr. Charles Stanley, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Atlanta, Georgia.

3. The ecumenicalism of Dr. Falwell serves to destroy Fundamentalism. How does Dr.

Falwell justify violating the principles of Biblical separation so blatantly? His explanation is as follows:

You say, "Hey, how in the world could you stand with a crowd like that?" Hey, when a ship is going down and you are out in the water and a fellow throws you a life-saver, you don't ask him, "Are you a Baptist?" You work that out later. We are talking about the survival of the country. We are not talking about theological differences and likenesses. (BLU-PRINT, 4-29-80).

What a humanistic philosophy! In a crisis of morality, one does not cast aside one's principles for survival. Far better to lose our country than our principles. The Scripture must dictate our practice, not the situation.

The responsibility of the Church is to occupy until Jesus returns. This involves winning the lost and making a faithful disciple of each believer. As one man has said, we are to be busy building God's kingdom, not Liberty Mountain. We must never forget that our weapons are preaching and prayer and personal righteousness. Again it must be emphasized, God's work must be done God's way.

possible.

These no longer asked, "How much can we give," but "how little." They no longer brought the best of the flock. Instead they brought that which was of least value, the torn, the sick, the worthless. And I am quite sure that this is the case with many of us today. We are robbing God in tithes and offerings.

We who are Christians should so far as possible give a tithe of our incomes as a minimum. Some of us should give far more, because we are able to do so. But everybody ought to try to give at least a tenth. This I say for the following reasons: Tithing is Scriptural. Here are the solid facts upon which this demand rests

First, God is the absolute owner of everything. "All things were made by Him, and without Him was not anything made that was made." "The earth is the Lord's, and the fulness thereof, the

world, and they that dwell therein." We are His, His by right of creation, and by right of redemption. To that I think we all agree.

Second, since God owns all, we ought to set aside a certain part of our income in acknowledgement of His ownership. If we fail to do so, we come to believe that we are owners of our substance rather than the possessors, a conviction that always leads to spiritual impoverishment.

Finally, since God owns all, and since we ought to make some acknowledgement of His ownership, it is God's right to say what should be set aside. I am saying it here, not because it is new, but because it is true. It is the one proportion mentioned in the Old Testament, and those who refused to tithe were accused of dealing dishonestly with God.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Title I programs are in two categories — in-class programs and pull-out programs. While in-class programs are most effective, pullouts are most common, because schools fear that the government will audit the Title I spending and remove funds which are not being used most efficiently. And if that doesn't make sense to you, it is because you don't understand that the government intends for this money to be used in the most inefficient way possible. Congress doesn't want Title I money spent on anyone but Title I children; therefore, they insist on pulling some kids out of regular class to give them their special class. When they return to their regular class, the teacher is interrupted for the second time and also is faced with the task of re-teaching the lesson which was missed. How this helps students is seldom discussed, and the reason is obvious. Title I classes continue to grow because the low achievers do not improve.

After studying Title I for several years, the National Institute for Education reported that the \$3.4 billion spent each year "does more good than harm." This is hardly a "glowing report" and reflects the attitude that nobody wanted to say it is a good program, but at the same time nobody wanted

to tell an obvious lie.

I have two observations concerning Title I which could serve as a warning to Christian schools. Beware of government money and any other source of funding which may have strings attached to it. Satan is subtle and he would love to get Christian schools obligated to a person or an organization that would direct the school away from the founder's original purposes.

Secondly, there is a real danger in Christian schools from the temptation to "pull-out" students for special activities at the expense of the basics. Although these special activities (band, choir, voice, art, piano, etc.) are not Title I, the results could be the same, in that some "average' students may become "below average" students. These things must be kept in mind when scheduling special activities. Individual attention is not new to the Christian school movement.

RELEVANT CURRICULUM

Closely related to the subject of Title I is the subject of relevant curriculum. Ionia Smith, a high school teacher in Tallahassee, Florida, calls her school's gradu-ation requirements "a joke." Such courses as mass media, check writing, child development, astrology, insurance, street law, science fiction, TV production, cheerleading, and preparing income tax returns all earn credit toward graduation. In a Maryland high school, a class even has "simulated marriage" in which student couples discuss buying furniture, child birth, and other related "relevant" topics.

A recent survey by the Council for Basic Education shows that 34 states require schools to offer courses on alcohol and drugs, but only 28 require them to teach English. How many high school kids do you know who would choose English as an elective? No wonder many high school graduates are functionally illiterate. Nearly half of the nation's kids aren't required

to take English!

Relevancy is not limited to high school classes either. A teacher of the third grade at Jefferson School in Dixon, Illinois, has been instructing members of her class in the art of writing ransom notes. "I have your daughter," read one. "I will give her back for \$2,000. If you want her back, drop it in Jefferson School's garbage can. If you call the cops, I will kill your daughter." When questioned, the teacher explained that the purpose "was to teach the children that communications have to be specific."

Now that is relevant teaching!

SEX EDUCATION

Perhaps the most controversial "relevant" classes have been the courses in sex which are taught from high school down to fifth grade. In high schools, where sex education is frequently part of a biology course, no efforts were made to separate the boys and the girls, according to the Gannett News Series. In the lower grades, however, the sexes were usually segregated.

In Indianapolis, a fifth grade class of boys saw a film covering

the basic equipment of males and females, including the development of a fetus. After the film, written questions were submitted. Among

Is nine years old too early to have sex?

What is the effect of grass or uppers and downers on a baby?

What if you're 10 years old and you think you have VD, will they tell your parents?

In the same school, two sixth grade couples spent their midday "rec period" locked in romantic embraces in the gym, in view of their classmates and teachers. The teachers made no attempt to stop their hugging, but later reprimanded them for kissing. These same teachers later expressed surprise at some of the knowledgeable and mature questions asked by fifthand sixth-graders during sex education class.

It seems strange to me that teachers who teach the mechanics of sex would be surprised at students who practice what they are taught and also ask mature questions. This does not surprise the teachers of other subjects. It seems reasonable that, when a student is. taught a subject, he should practice it (do homework) and ask questions about that which is not fully understood. This same principle should be applied to drug education as well as other "relevant" subjects.

TELEVISION

Teachers interviewed by the GNS reporters blame television for many of the problems which are being encountered by the public schools. If they are right, we can expect some of the same problems to exist in Christian schools. One of the problems referred to in the GNS series is what they call the "new maturity." In other words, kids know much more about certain subjects than they used to. The public school combats this "new maturity" in a way which tends to aggravate the situation. When kids know too much about sex, drugs, etc., the public school teaches them how to use this knowledge in a sensible, practical way (new morality). The Christian school must face this same "new maturity" and cope with it in a Scriptural way.

We can pretend that our students have not been affected by the "new maturity" and simply ignore the problem, or we can meet it head on, call it sin, and deal with it in a Godly manner in Bible class and from the chapel pulpit.

of his life. Elijah was pursued, fed by ravens, and forced to share the widow's meagre fare while his life hung in balance because he contended for God's truth versus Baalism. Jeremiah, the weeping prophet, was imprisoned and suffered attempts upon his life through starvation, being cast into a pit of quick-sand, and in other ways because he contended for the faith. Contending caused Daniel's three companions to be cast into the burning fiery furnace. Daniel was placed in the lions' den for the same reason.

not by common people who heard Him gladly, neither by publicans, nor the woman out of whom he cast seven demons, nor by the thief saved on Golgotha, but by the unsaved, apostate religious leaders of His day because He was God's truth (John 14:6) and contended for it by teaching, ministry and life. The majority of the apostles paid for their contending by martyrdom, Stephen by being stoned to death (Acts 7:54-60), and the Apostle John by being exiled on the Isle of Patmos. Had they not contended for God's revealed truth, their experience would have been far different.

The price the Apostle Paul paid was to be misunderstood, misrepresented, slandered, threatened with continuous riots, starvation, imprisonments, receiving of hundreds of stripes, beatings with rods, being stoned, perils on every hand, attempts upon his life, being made the offscouring of society, and martyrdom by beheading. He suffered the loss of all things because he contended earnestly for the faith once delivered unto the saints.

... The price of contending is paid in proportion to one's separation from apostasy. Spurgeon said, "The most effective testimony against apostasy is separation from it." This is God's Bible method in contending for the faith.

Paying the price of contending will call for reconciliation to

- 1) Sacrificing popularity;
- 2) Willingness to be unpopular;
- 3) Willingness to be misunderstood,

misrepresented, wrongly accused, slandered;

- 4) Willingness to be criticized, belittled, and mocked;
- Willingness to be classed as backward, lacking in education and learning;
- 6) Loss of prestige, pulpit and platform opportunities;
- 7) Possible sacrifice of pastoring a church;
- 8) Being branded as non-cooperative, even a trouble-maker
- 9) Sacrifice of advancement in pastoral position and otherwise;
- 10) Sacrifice of income and material comforts;
- 11) Sacrifice of pension, insurance, material security;
- Severance of fellowship with lifelong friends, especially in the religious realm;
- 13) Testing in maintaining a Christhonoring spirit of patience, prayer and spiritual love toward Christians who are biblically uninformed or dull, cold, compromising, even backslidden, in their Christian state, also with apostates and subtle sinful apostate opposition;
- 14) Testing as to patiently waiting for God to honor biblical witnessing, living and service;
- 15) Determination to obey God's Word though all others disobey, to betrue to Christ whether one's stand is ever justified before mankind or not;
- 16) Trusting the outcome to the faithfulness of a faithful God;
- 17) Witnessing, living and serving in the light of Christ's coming Bemaseat judgment for works (I Corinthians 3:11-15):
- 18) Practicing continually, by God's grace, the courage of Athanasius who, while contending for the Deity of Christ and the Trinity of the Godhead through resisting the Arian Unitarian error of early Christian centuries, refused to

compromise though appealed to do so by Emperor Theodocius (Theodocius, in bitterness of spirit, said, "Do you not realize that all the world is against you?" Athanasius, realizing that the foundations of Christianity were at stake in the controversy concerning Bible truth and the Christian faith, replied to the Emperor, "Then I am against all the world.");

- 19) A contending price, which will be continuous vigilance;
- 20) Such Bible study as to enable one to know God's truth, discern error, and expose subtle, destructive teachings (Such a stand will demand a consistent, sacrificial life in order to strengthen the message);

A most effective means of counteracting apostasy and contending for the faith is an exemplary life, also the building of a constructive Christian work. Opposition cannot meet nor overcome such procedure, such procedure is impossible apart from an unselfish spirit, service not motivated by income, personal gain, nor future security. Such contending demands service saturated with prayer, teaching of God's Word, witnessing for Christ, and bulwarked by Holy-Spirit-controlled life and service. These were the God given and enabled methods of the Church in the Book of Acts. They will never be improved upon. . . .

The greatest Christian servant from among mankind, the Apostle Paul, when facing earthly departure, said, "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith" (II Timothy 4:7). May every saved one realize that such testimony is impossible apart from contending for the faith once delivered unto the saints (Jude 3). May they, by appropriating Christ's all-sufficient grace (II Corinthians 12:9), so live and serve their Savior as to merit such testimony.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS

TESTING

The National Education Association has been pushing since 1972 to ban typical standardized achievement tests, arguing that once students are labeled "slow" they tend to live up to that label.

The federal judge whom President Jimmy Carter appointed the nation's first Secretary of Education has told the world that she is suspicious of literacy tests before high school graduation. It will be recalled that such tests are being promoted so that high school diplomas might be said to guarantee a prospective employer that a graduate can at least read and write.

Secretary of Education
Hufstedler, who has had no professional experience in either
public or private education, apparently feels that literacy tests
are unfair because some students
fail them. She reportedly said:
"One has to be suspicious of tests
when one does not know who put them
together." To which she added:
"There have been instances when
literacy tests were totally unfair
because the youngsters who were
given the tests were not given the
education to pass them."

It should be obvious to the casual observer that public educators dislike tests because testing proves that they are getting paid for something which is not being accomplished. When children don't learn, it is usually because teachers haven't taught. There are two sides to the coin of testing and public educators don't like people looking on their side of the coin.

The Gannett article reports:
The College Board in New Jersey
hired a blue-ribbon panel several
years ago to find out why Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores
started sinking in the 1963-64
school year. The panel concluded
that at first it was because a much
larger pool of students was taking
the college entrance test.

But after 1970, when the pool stopped growing, scores continued to sink. The panel speculated that it was because students were living in "a decade of distraction" — Lalevision, changing family lifestyles, the political upheaval over the Vietnam War, and Watergate.

The panel also noted that high

school curricula had ballooned with new courses since 1962, which might have contributed to the decline.

The GNS team found an astonishing variety of classes in high schools — consumer math, mass media, logic, child care, TV production, farm skills, marriage simulation — and students were dropping traditional academic subjects to take them.

If the SAT tested skills in mass media, logic, and child care, several educators said with a laugh, perhaps the scores would go up.

Something like that happened when the National Assessment of Educational Progress tested math achievement in 1973 and 1978.

In general math skills, 9-year-olds registered a slight decline, 13-year-olds a moderate decline, and 17-year-olds a substantial drop. But youngsters across the board showed a substantial increase in knowledge about metrics. Congress was paying schools to teach metric education.

FEAR OF GOD

The GNS report suggests that a return to the "old toughness" is what is needed in the public schools. Mrs. Carol Mass, a mother of three in Sacramento, summed it up this way - "When I was in school there were four things that you feared. You just feared them when they were even mentioned in conversation. They were your parents, the teacher, the school principal, and a policeman." agree, if students feared these four things a great deal of the problems in public education would be solved; however, public school students will never fear these four things because these fears are a result of another fear which must come first. Proverbs 9:10 states: "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom: and the knowledge of the holy is understanding." It is only when children fear God that the proper fear of parents, teacher, principal, and policeman is also evident in their lives.



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
