IS AUTHORITY A BAD WORD?

It is impossible to do away with God without attempting to do away with authority. Authority is necessary for there to be order and order brings peace and progress as well as many other benefits. Your child needs to grow up in a tranquil atmosphere where peace of mind is possible and progress in every area of a child's This kind of growth is normal. atmosphere can only come parents recognize their responsibility to back the authority which they themselves have authorized to be over their child. There are, of course, those who abuse authority and this cannot be tolerated by those responsible, however, the worse thing that can happen to your child is not that they be mistreated or not believed, as bad as that kind of thing may be, but that the parents and the school get at odds causing a

breakdown in the authority structure over the child. Authority must always stand united in behalf of the child. If the parents and the school have differences, let these be settled privately without the knowledge of the child, but let the child always see unity...this is for the good of the child.

#### PARENTS' SUPPORT

Parents' support of the teacher is primarily for the benefit of the child. It certainly makes the teacher's work more enjoyable and their life easier as well; however, happier and more contented teacher also works for the benefit of the

When a teacher knows that support from home will be direct and forceful, that teacher will be able to accomplish so much more with a student. When, however, a teacher feels that any attempt to correct a child will be questioned by parent, that teacher labors under a handicap, the ultimate result

which will make the teacher less effective in accomplishing desired objectives in that child's The value of parents progress. support cannot be overestimated. Of the many things that must come together to comprise success in the educational process, it is my opinion that none is more important than that those in authority over the child be solidly united. Parents back the school and the school backs the parents. This combination practically assures success for the child, and after all, isn't that the bottom line.

SOME DOS AND DON'TS FOR PARENTS FOR THE GOOD OF THE CHILD

DO:

Support your child's school, including the administration and the teachers.

Express your support openly so your child knows your position.

Take the teacher's word about incidents. If you have questions, talk privately to the teacher without the child's knowledge.

# Is It A Sin For A Christian To Teach In The Public Schools?

Christian schools across America are approaching a crisis shortage competent teachers. In the face this critical shortage we are seeing a not so subtle shift in the attitudes of some Christian college education graduates toward the public schools and away from Christian schools. Should this trend continue to accelerate, the consequences for Christian schools will be devastating. Aside from the practical difficulties this lack of conviction for Christian education presents, there are some significant moral and ethical issues that must be considered by the public school teacher who is a Christian.

These education graduates generally list four basic reasons for their willingness to teach in the public schools:

- 1. To be a testimony
- 2. To evangelize
- To salvage the system
   To have a "secular" job

A Christian teacher evangelizing in government sponsored coerced educational system of pluralistic society raises important questions. Because. the schools are governmental agencies, the teacher is a paid agent and representative of the government. The U.S. Constitution demands

the government observe a strict neutrality toward all religious The burden of the First Amendment is that government may not advance or favor, in any way, one religion over another and, as recently interpreted, may not advance religion over non-religion. Many court decisions have confirmed these facts. In 1977, for example, in the case of MALNAK vs. YOGI, the court even ruled that the public schools may not teach that God says it is wrong to steal. Christians, then, are clearly forbidden by law to bring Christianity to bear on man's problems in the public school classroom.

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# Stunning Revelations About Fundamentalist Leader

Dr. Robert Sumner in the May 1 issue of The Biblical Evangelist released an amazing array of accusations involving Dr. Jack Hyles of First Baptist Church of Hammond, Indiana and founder of Hyles-Anderson College. The accusations involve both immorality, doctrinal deviation and questions about money handling. It is a sad and sorry tale.

I am not prepared to deal with it fully until we hear from Hyles, Hutson, and others. However, I must say that I was not totally surprised at the revelations. Much of it seems consistent with other things I have observed through the years. Some of the things are so bizarre as to border on the unbelievable. Yet, a double minded man is unstable in all his ways. And it is true that sin often finds us out in most unusual circumstances.

Robert Sumner is one of the most careful newspapermen among fundamentalists, usually bending backward to get his facts straight. It is true that he has had conflicts with Curtis Hutson. And as he said "we all put our pants on one leg at a time" and we are all liable to follow our personal biases occasionally. However, I searched the article on Hyles for any deliberate effort to implicate Hutson and with the possible exception of the info on John Stancil (which appeared to be pertinent) I found none.

As I have thought about this tragic development I remembered two say-One, Martin Luther observed that God allows spiritual leaders to fall into sexual immorality as a judgment upon their personal pride. and second, what parents allow in moderation their children will do in excess. When we saw the awful immorality of Dave Hyles and the Smith boys (Jack's protégés), should have looked up river to see where the stream was polluted.

One pastor observed that the greatest problem here is the "guru mentality," the Jim Jones syndrome, the demand for absolute loyalty to a man that should be reserved for God alone. It is likely that the moral and doctrinal perversions grew out of this if Luther's perceptive comment is correct.

Some would possibly reply, should obey God rather than men", and then proceed to proselytize contrary to court rulings. The problem, unfortunately, is not that simple. Such rulings are not absolute but severely limited; our free society still leaves many opportunities to reach these children in their homes, churches, and almost any place except under the aegis of the state; and so it should be.

Such teacher propagation then of any religion is illegal; teacher propaga-tion is state propagation as far as the law is concerned. Also, overt or covert classroom evangelizing conveys a message to the student that the teacher is disobedient to higher authority and a lawbreaker - an example hardly conducive to a good personal testimony and the building of good citizenship in the student.

It also violates the spirit of fair play and true religious liberty. All states compel, by law, these children to be in the classroom. Baptists, for example, would rightly resent Jehovah's Witness public school teacher "witnessing" to their chilschool dren. That Jehovah's Witness orthodoxy was only "bootlegged" into the classroom would be of little consolation to Baptists; nor that the charm of the teacher merely seduced the child to an after class "religious conversation". Compulsory attendance laws force children into the orbit of a teacher's influence. such a context, all religions have a right to have their children protected from the missionary activity of all others. Some would answer that since the state teaches humanism we have a right to teach Christianity. Christians never have a right to coerce or be unfair; we don't do evil that good may come.

public In sum, a Christian in a school cannot be truly useful for Christ without raising serious moral, ethical, and legal questions. Their presence there causes some practical problems as well:

- 1. It creates a moral dilemma for Christian parents. Some parents interpret the presence of a Christian in the system as approval of the system as a whole. The consequence is that the Christian teacher draws Christian children into the contaminating environment of humanism and corrupt peer influence.
- 2. It subtly undermines in the minds of such parents God's mandate for a Christian education.
- It gives credibility to a system that has and deserves no

credibility. Such a teacher, particularly a highly competent one, has the cosmetic affect of hiding an inexorably humanistic and therefore morally destructive influence.

4. It holds up the hands of an implacable enemy of the church. In state after state, it is the public school establishment which drives the legislatures to oppress Christian school ministries. We might well ask these teachers the question that was asked of Jehoshaphat, "Shouldest thou help the ungodly and love them that hate the Lord?" It would seem obvious then, that such teachers intensify the pressure on Christian schools. This is particularly true when they attend churches with a Christian school ministry.

The Scriptures make a distinction between a "weight" and a sin. A sin is a transgression of a clear precept in God's Word; a weight is something that hinders and limits our usefulness and therefore hurts God's cause. We are clearly commanded to lay aside every weight as well as the sin (Hebrews 12:1). To fail to do so once our weight is discovered can become sin. It becomes sin in that a clear command to lay weights is disobeyed. The Scriptures also remind us that to know to do good and not do it is sin. So then, is it a sin for a Christian to teach in the public schools? Perhaps it is best to identify such a situation as a weight that can become a sin. (MAGNOLIA MESSENGER, September, 1988)

"There are so many different kinds of soap, I could never decide which one was right."


The information office of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) distributed the piece, written by the Rev. Sidney Laing of Dublin, Ireland. also included these reasons:

"I used to wash, but it got boring so I stopped."

"I still wash on special occasions, like Christmas and Easter."

"I'm still young - when I'm older and have got a bit dirtier I might start washing." (Pensacola News Journal - 1989)

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Teaching children to think requires us to teach this skill "precept upon precept, line upon line." Children learn things in their simplest form first and then progress to the more difficult. We must follow and purposefully teach these skills to students in our Christian Schools. All teachers bemoan the difficulty in teaching their students to think at some time or other. If we break this skill into its simpler components, it is certainly easier to teach. We cannot expect children to think without first teaching them how. The Word of God explains what we are to think about and is the primary source of instruction in this skill. If we do not give our students something to think about, the world will certainly provide plenty to fill their minds.

If children are going to be taught to think, they must first be taught what they should think about. Christian School teachers have the opportunity to help their students learn about things which should be taught. Philippians 4:8 states, "Finally, Philippians 4:8 brethren, whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are honest, whatsoever things are lovely, whatsoever things are of good report, if there be any virtue, and if there be any praise, think on these things." area of the curriculum provides the basics of subject matter which is appropriate for us to ponder in our minds. Noah Webster's 1828 Dictionary defines the word think as, "to have the mind occupied on some subject, to have ideas, or to revolve ideas in the mind." We can give our students the facts concerning each subject area and also show them how to use these facts for use in forming ideas.

Very young children need guidance in thinking about simple truths. During kindergarten and the primary grades, teachers should help their students learn the wonders of God and His creation. We should give them time to do some thinking and make sure it is directed in a particular direction.

You might say, "Think about leaves." Then, proceed to ask questions concerning every aspect of leaves which you have taught. This helps direct young minds and develop the skills of concentration and self-discipline our pupils will need to think logically and clearly. It is not necessary or desirable to teach these young children the "why's" of the subjects taught. That type of understanding will come later. It is of utmost importance that they simply understand what is. This is true in the area of discipline as well. do not tell our little children why they must do this or that, but why expect voice obedience on the spot. Teaching children to think about a specific thing follows this nattern.

Upper elementary and middle school children are capable of developing the thinking skills of reasoning. teach our students the facts and then proceed in questioning as to why certain events followed. good to teach them deductive reasoning at this point. Use of "if. then" types of questions helps develop this In math, word skill. Examples: problems must be understood using the process of reasoning as to whether to add, subtract, multiply, or divide. In science children can reason concerning the development of plants. They know that plants need water, light, soil, etc., so reason what would happen if the plants got too much or too little? In history, the students could follow the battle plans of a war and judge whether the plans were suitable or what could have been done to change the outcome of the battle.

Children in these middle grades can enjoy learning to use their minds in developing reasoning skills. Teachers will learn more about their pupil's personality and mental abilities in the teaching of these skills.

When children have developed the discipline necessary to concentrate on a specific thought and learned how to use these thoughts in the reasoning process, they are ready to be taught to use their thinking skills in making decisions. We would not expect young children to make serious decisions about their until we have taught them lives the necessary skills. When children mature into young people in high school, they need to be taught decision making. In order to make good decisions, we need to have specific knowledge or facts upon which to We must also base our decisions. have the reasoning skills to know the outcomes of our decisions. We can teach decision making by studying

examples of people in the past and present. Examples: In history. students could study the decisions made by leaders - Benedict Arnold, Robert E. Lee, Joseph Stalin are a few. A newspaper provides current events and students could follow the decisions of such people as Oliver North, the President, and others. In science, your students could study the use of nuclear weapons, environmental hazards, and development of new technology. These need to be well planned out by the teacher, who must direct the students thought processes and lead them in the right directions.

Teachers on every level must be careful to point students to the Scripture as the ultimate authority in the thinking process. We must all submit our thoughts to the will of God. As our pupils graduate and continue their training in a Christian college or university, they should have the background to discipline their minds (as well as their hearts) to the leading of God in their lives.

Psalms Vol. III Page 434

Psalms 78:4-8 "We will not hide them from their children, shewing to the generation to come the praises of the LORD, and his strength, and his wonderful works that he hath done.

Verse 5: For he established a testimony in Jacob, and appointed a law in Israel, which he commanded our fathers, that they should make them known to their children:

Verse 6: That the generation to come might know them, even the children which should be born; who should arise and declare them to their children:

Verse 7: That they might set their hope in God, and not forget the works of God, but keep his commandments:

Verse 8: And might not be as their fathers, a stubborn and rebellious generation; a generation that set not their heart aright, and whose spirit was not stedfast with God."

# MINCED OATHS

A visiting minister was asked to lead in prayer in Sunday School. When he had finished, a teacher heard one of her girls whisper, "Gosh, what a prayer!"

In expressing one's appreciation of a prayer, such an exclamation seems incongruous enough. A little further thought will lead anyone to the conclusion that gosh is not an appropriate word for a Christian on any occasion. Yet, it is a fact that some Christian people are habitual users of expressions which the dictionary terms minced oaths.

Let us look into the meaning of such interjections, using as our authority Webster's New International Dictionary. Two common words and their definitions are these: "Golly - a euphemism for God used in minced oaths." Gosh - a substitute for God, used in minced oaths." Darn, darned, and darnation are said to be "colloquial euphemisms for damned, and damnation." Persons who allow their lips to utter,

Gosh-darned, quite freely, would be shocked if they realized the real meaning of the expression.

When he was a child, a certain minister - now a professor-in a sound seminary - was not allowed to use goodness, mercy, or gracious, as exclamations. He was inclined to think of these restrictions as a family peculiarity - merely a parental overcarefulness. Today, however, he can see that they had a sound Scriptural basis. The Westminster Shorter Catechism asks, "What is required in the third commandment?" and then gives this answer: "The third commandment requireth holy and reverent use of God's Name, titles, attributes, words, and works." Certainly goodness, mercy, and graciousness are attributes of God.

The use of minced oaths is quite contrary to the spirit of New Testament teaching. For example, our Lord Jesus said: "But I say unto you, Swear not at all... But let your communication be, Yea, yea; Nay, nay; for whatsoever is more than these cometh of evil" (Matthew 5:34,37).

The phrase, whatsoever is more than these, suggests the use of an excla-

mation, defined as: "Something added merely as a filling; especially a word, letter, or syllable not necessary to the sense, but inserted to fill a vacancy."

James, in writing his epistle, repeats almost exactly the words of Christ as quoted above, but adds warning: "... That ye fall not under judgment." That last word recalls "But I say our Lord's declaration: unto you, that every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgment. For by thy words thou shalt be justified, and by thy words thou shalt be condemned" (Matthew 12:36,37).

If we try to excuse ourselves by saying that these exclamations slip through our lips unawares, we need to heed the Holy Spirit's warning in the epistle of James: "If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain" (James 1:26).

James seems puzzled by the same irregularity that puzzles us, namely: the presence of minced oaths on the lips of Christians. He writes of the See OATHS, page 8

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

Look at the article below that appeared in <u>The Extended Hand</u> March, 1989.

The headline read:

GET CHURCH BUSES OFF THE ROAD

Let Drunks Have the Highway!

The article followed:

We expected it. We predicted it. Kentucky passed a new regulation requiring the inspection of church buses after a drunk entered an interstate highway on the wrong side, meeting traffic at combined speeds of 110 miles an hour. The drunk hit a school bus. He killed many children. The newspeople blamed the bus, Ford Motor Company, Congress, seats, doors, windows, gas tanks, and everything but beer.

When we carelessly follow others in their use of these common minced oaths, we dull our own spiritual sensitiveness and weaken our Christian testimony.

If we are to gain the victory in this matter, becoming fully obedient to our Lord Jesus, we will need to make the prayer of David our daily petition:

"Let the words of my mouth, and the meditation of my heart, be acceptable in thy sight, O Lord, my strength, and my Redeemer" (Psalm 19:14).
