"The heart is deceitful above all things and desperately wicked; who can know it?" (Jer. 17:9). What a clear portrait God gives of the depraved human heart!

THE OLD MAN

A fundamental truth of Scripture is that the human heart is one hundred percent evil. We must I understand that not one human being, born of sinful parents, has ever had a heart with any good in it. Contrary to what some may believe, God says the heart of man is totally depraved and can never I be reformed however well it is educated or well nurtured. It will never become good. We need to know that the old nature will always be the old nature. It will always be depraved. It will always be evil. Sin will never be eradicated from the flesh in this life. (Romans 3:23; 1 John 1:8).

THE NEW MAN

Now when we come to repentance, put our faith exclusively in the Lamb of God who shed His blood on Calvary, and are regenerated by the Holy Spirit we become sons of God by this new birth. (John 1:12). We have sins forgiven and are justified before a righteous God, Who gives us a divine I nature. The righteousness of the Lord Jesus Christ I is imputed to our account. We are wonderfully reconciled to God and can then call Him, "Abba, Father". Oh, what grace that God would extend such mercy to lost sinners! (Romans 5:8; II Corinthians 5:21; Titus 3:5).

THE CONFLICT

Here's the crunch... We have the new man, which is born of God. We are His creation. We are His workmanship. The new nature cannot sin, but the old man, the old nature, the flesh, the old heart still remains and is still totally corrupt, entirely evil, depraved, and can do nothing but sin. God has set a standard before us that in this present body we are unable to reach, but as the poet, Robert Browning, said, "A man's reach should exceed his grasp or what's a heaven for?" One thing is for sure, we are not to lower the standard and thereby claim obedience, as I am afraid many do. Failure to be able to § reach God's standard should create in ? us an humble and contrite heart, which God promises He will not § despise (Isaiah 57:15).

The High Jump

"When I was much, much younger, I used to compete in some track events, one of which was the High Jump. don't recall ever finishing first in the high jump at a track meet, but I did enjoy the competition. 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Exposing Error: Is it Worthwhile?

Objection is often raised—even by some sound in the faith—regarding the exposure of error as being entirely negative and of no real edification. Of late, the hue and cry has been against any and all negative teaching. But the brethren who assume this attitude forget that a large part of the New Testament, both of the teaching of our blessed Lord Himself and the writings of the apostles, is made up of this very character of ministry—namely, showing the Satanic origin and, therefore, the unsettling results of the propagation of erroneous systems which Peter, in his second epistle, so definitely refers to as "damnable heresies."

Our Lord prophesied, "Many false prophets shall rise, and shall deceive many." Within our own day, how many false prophets have risen; and oh, how many are the deceived! Paul predicted, "I know this, that after my departing shall grievous wolves enter in among you, not sparing the flock. Also of your own selves shall men arise, speaking perverse things, to draw away disciples after them. Therefore watch." My own observation is that these "grievous wolves," alone and in packs, are not sparing even the most favoured flocks. Undershepherds in these "perilous times" will do well to note the apostle's warning: "Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock, over the which the Holy (Continued on Page 9)

sincerity, while at the same time being disloyal to Him. Foul as Hell is, I believe Hell is defiled by betrayers of the grace and love of God extended to us through the Lord Jesus being full of grace and truth. Jeremiah referred to Judah's harlotry and her disloyalty to God, after His care and concern to give them every opportunity to respond in genuine love, as "treacherous". (Jeremiah 3:20; 5:11).

Disloyalty to our fellow man is a serious issue, but to have an insincere relationship with Almighty God, Who knows the hearts of men, is quite another situation.

John, Chapter 13 gives the ultimate example of apostasy and betrayal of

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Teaching Tips

HOLIDAYS!

Synopsis: Christian teachers should prayerfully use every circumstance as a teaching opportunity to help students be aware of God's Hand in all the occurrences of life. Holidays should especially be viewed in this way. "Keep it simple; keep your academic schedule moving; and prepare ahead of time" are rules of the road. Last issue covered suggestions for Labor Day, President's Day, Veterans Day, and Thanksgiving. Following are others for consideration.

- 5) Christmas Day Teach only the true reason for this season. This is one of the most difficult celebrations to communicate and guide, because the children have been so bewitched by the commercialization of this holiday. Christian School teachers need to continually point children to the birth of the Christ Child and its necessity in our salvation. You can also use this season to help children understand the importance of giving rather than receiving. Look for ways they can give: library books for their school library, love offerings for their school's needs, gifts for missionaries or the needy. It is also important to learn to give of themselves-of their own time, attention, and effort to help others. Help elderly people clean their yard or house or do their shopping. Visit convalescent homes. Spend time talking with the older folks, asking questions, showing interest in their lives. This means much to the elderly and certainly broadens the children's horizons. Visit shut-ins at home—take along some cookies, read the Scriptures aloud for them, wash their dishes, sweep their porch—teach the children to look for ways to be a help and blessing. Life is too short to live for self, and this truth is best taught early by example as well as instruction.
- 6) Mother's Day and Father's Day These holidays are usually celebrated at home, but Christian teachers can help students learn what the Bible standard is for Mothers and Fathers. They should learn and practice the meaning of "Honor thy father and thy mother: that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee (Ex 20:12).
- 7) **Memorial Day** This special holiday commemorates those who have given their lives in defense of our country. Read about memorable battles. Discuss how many died and how they were killed. Let students tell of such persons in their own family. Make the purpose and meaning of Memorial Day real to students!

There are other holidays during the school year, but they lack a historical or biblical heritage. You may choose to celebrate or mention them, but the "rules" will still help you maintain purpose, order, and control. Keep in mind that these holiday celebrations help students make treasured memories they will take with them through life. We want those memories to be of things that are right and Christ-honoring — sweet memories, not bitter or selfish, — so your extra praying, planning, and preparation will be richly worth it. Ω

Proverbs 11:25 — The liberal soul shall be made fat: and he that watereth shall be watered also himself.

Can you believe that God has given us a proverb about a fat liberal who is all wet? Liberal! Fat! We don't find ourselves much akin to words like these. In our day, "liberals" are considered those folks who support give-away programs and fund welfare and handouts. Christians declare, "Don't call me a liberal; I'm conservative to the bone." Not only are we mortified by the word, "liberal" in this proverb, but we also come face to face with the "fat" word!

No Fat!

Fat is not a welcome word in today's culture, which daily declares war on fat. "Get the fat out!", "Check the label for the fat content!", "Be fat, ruin your health, and die early." We are told to buy *low* fat butter, milk, meat, and even *no* fat products. "Down with fat!" But this proverb says, "The liberal soul shall be made fat." Who wants to be fat?

Be careful! If God's Word says we should be liberal, we should want to be liberal, and if fat is a by-product, we should want to be fat! Take heart, it is not a bad thing to be liberal or fat in the Bible sense.

The Bible word, "liberal", means blessing, present, or gift. This proverb is not talking about a person who simply gives money away; it is talking about a person, who is a walking blessing, a soul of giving, a soul, who by his actions blesses others. This soul is a blessing to be around and causes others to increase. This is a giving soul, a gift to others for their benefit.

The Giver

How does fat enter the picture? How does this soul of blessing become fat? This has nothing to do with the appearance of the body but everything to do with the spiritual condition of the soul. The picture is of a soul who continually blesses. He is a giver, but by being a giver something comes back to him and that something is what the Bible calls fat. It is from a

word translated to anoint, to set apart, to satisfy.

So the liberal soul, who gives out, is a satisfied one, because he is committed to being a blessing, a giver, instead of a taker. As a giver, he is made fat and content. He does not want to go on a diet but desires the fatness of God.

The Receiver

As he continues to give of himself and his means to others, he continues to receive this good "fat" and is blessed with the contentment that comes from being a liberal soul. The blessings he bestows on others return to him multifold.

Those who preach, teach, witness, or otherwise share the Word of God, often insist that while their listeners may receive a little shower, they themselves get a downpour. They learn the lessons and receive blessing by their study in preparation for watering others with the Word of God. Those who minister, who water in this way, are more refreshed by their preparation than can ever be received by the hearers in the short time of instruction.

The Reward

The lesson is this! God desires us to be a blessing to others, and He will return blessings to us. His returns may come in a different form; they may come immediately or later. God gives us seeds for sowing. There is no blessing in holding on to them. We sow, we water, and God gives the flowers. The flowers are a great return on the seeds in a packet. Paul said, "I have planted, Apollos watered; but God gave the increase" (I Cor. 3:6).

"Cast thy bread upon the waters; for thou shalt find it after many days" (Eccl. 11:1). God may even give you cinnamon rolls! Teach others and you will be taught tenfold. Help others and you will be helped. Comfort others and you will be comforted.

Word Power

A few years ago I came across a statement by Dr. Frank Sells that I recorded in the fly-leaf of my Bible. It reads, "Man's words lack convicting power, but God's words are filled with convicting power." Though simple, the weight of that statement has worked to strengthen my own personal appreciation of the verbal inspiration of the Bible.

Man has always tried to soften and emasculate the meaning of God's words so as to remove the sting and convicting power. For instance, men often use the word "alcoholic". Is that a Bible word? No! What is the Bible word? It is "drunkard". Man's word is "alcoholism", God's Word is "drunkenness." In my opinion there is not one ounce of convicting power in the word "alcoholic"; however, there is compelling force in "drunkard".

Now, it is possible to be excessively concerned about using only the words of Scripture and miss better words that convey a clearer translation. There are many good words that may be used in some cases to better translate the Hebrew, the Greek, and even the English Bible; however, that being said, I think there should be a strong consciousness concerning the use of and the recognition of the convicting power of God's words.

Here are some examples of God's Words versus man's words:

God's Words Man's Words

Steal Borrow, shoplift, appropriate
Lie Fib, misstatement, spin

Abomination Alternate lifestyle
Disobedience Self-assertion

Converts Inquirers who need to be led

Deny yourself Self-acceptance

Preach Moralize, lecture, challenge, counsel
Pride Self-esteem, egotism, self-love
Slothful, Sluggard Unmotivated, day-dreamer

Rod Paddle, Belt, strap

Recently, while supervising our church operated baseball program, one of our coaches called me over to the fence where his team was practicing. He asked for some advice about his son who was posing some discipline problems at home. He began the conversation with the exclamation, "I whip him every night with a belt and he still misbehaves!" Immediately I responded by saying that he was using the wrong instrument. I told him that God never promised to bless the use of a belt. I then asked the coach what God had said in His Word to use as an instrument of chastisement. His eyes grew to the size of saucers and then he answered rather quietly, "A rod". I then took the time to explain the meaning of the word "rod", which in the Hebrew is "choter", a sprout, a tender young shoot that grows from a stump or the ground. (In the South we call it a "switch". I am not sure what they call it in the North.) After a few minutes of conversation we parted, but my coach friend went away with God's word, "rod", on his heart and mind rather than his own word.

This is a perfect example of the convicting power of God's words over man's words. When we use our own words we are stepping out on our own as to their power and effectiveness. When we use God's words we have the divine power of God behind them and their effectiveness will be much greater.

Ghost hath made you overseers." It is as important in these days as in Paul's—in fact, it is increasingly important—to expose the many types of false teaching that, on every hand, abound more and more.

We are called upon to "contend earnestly for the faith once for all delivered to the saints," while we hold the truth in love. The faith means the whole body of revealed truth, and to contend for all of God's truth necessitates some negative teaching. The choice is not left with Jude said he preferred a different, a pleasanter theme-"Beloved, when I gave all diligence to write unto you of the common salvation, it was needful for me to write unto you, and exhort you that ye should earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints. For there are certain men crept in unawares, who were before of old ordained to this condemnation, ungodly men, turning the grace of our God into lasciviousness, and denying the only Lord God, and our Lord Jesus Christ" (Jude 3,4). Paul likewise admonishes us to "have no fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness, but rather reprove them" (Eph. 5:11).

This does not imply harsh treatment of those entrapped by error—quite the opposite. If it be objected that exposure to error necessitates unkind reflection upon others who do not see as we do, our answer is: it has always been the duty of every loyal servant of Christ

the Lord Jesus Christ by the infamous scoundrel, Judas Iscariot. Jesus had just washed the disciples' feet, including Judas', showing them the example of humility, submission, and loyalty. Notice, also, Judas had just eaten with them, affirming his friendship and loyalty to the Savior and the others, having already made a pact to betray the Lord to the enemy. (Luke 22:6). This, I think, is the pinnacle of evil, the depths of depravity, the complete rot found in the man's wicked heart! What treachery!

See how Judas grew worse under the perfect presence and teaching of the Lord. Satan must have deceived Judas into thinking he was not the absolute rogue he certainly was, so Judas "pursued evil" to his own death. (Prov. 11:19). Judas gives us every reason for hating sin and turning away from even the smell of the world.

REAL OR PHONY?

There is no life, no peace, no hope, no security, no joy to a deceived apostate feigning salvation and displaying a facade of spirituality. Dear friend, be sure of your heart before the Lord. Allow the Word of God to reveal your heart's condition without delay. Trust Him, love Him, and live for Him.

Praise God, there is "joy unspeakable and full of glory" to the children of God, the remnant, who truly love the Savior and openly disdain the world, holding the old flesh in the greatest contempt, for unto them that look for Him shall He appear the second time without sin unto salvation (Hebrews 9:28). Ω

not try to maintain a level a few years behind the world's decreasing standards."1

Substitute Standards

As we have previously stated, Voice Obedience is the standard God sets for His children: the immediate, complete, and voluntary obedience to His Word the first time He speaks. What a standard!! What are we to do then as parents and educators when children refuse to cooperate with us in an effort to have them respond to our voice? An option is not to resort to a non-Christian method that may bring about peace to some degree but is bound to reap a harvest from the flesh and not from the Spirit. Here are points to consider:

- 1. It will not be easy. Doing things right rarely is; however, as Christians, God's Word must be the standard.
- 2. This is primarily the responsibility of parents. It certainly will not be as easy to start this requirement after school age is reached as it would have been at the beginning, but with determination and patience it can be done. Any improvement in this direction will bring blessing to both parent and child.
- 3. Parents and teachers must cooperate in this effort. Teachers explaining voice obedience from the Scriptures to parents in special sessions should be a help. A Christian must use Biblical methods in order to claim God's blessing. Support by the home is vital to success in any area of child training and especially so in the matters of obedience.
- 4. Remember your authority is only in your word, your voice. It is not in a "paddle" (a non-scriptural instrument), or emotional outbursts, or threats. It is in your voice just as God's authority is in His Word. Don't use your voice foolishly. Say what you mean and mean what you say.

Sound Words

"Hold fast the form of sound words" (II Tim. 1:13a). Sound words are scriptural words, and obviously, unsound words are not scriptural. The scriptural word is "Voice Obedience", while the unscriptural words are multiplying with each new school year.

Unsound Words

1. Assertive Discipline: This is the brain child of Lee Canter, yet the primary thrust is man-centered. In this approach, the teacher is to maintain control by asserting himself, being stronger and more aggressive than the student; yet, the toughest penalty that can be imposed is a trip to the principal's office. First-year teachers learn to do that on the first day of school. One of the primary goals of Assertive Discipline is to build strong "self-esteem" into the students. Look up self-esteem in Webster's New World

Dictionary and you will find it to be a synonym for pride or selfworth.

- 2. Discipline by Persuasion: The idea of persuasion is confined in Scripture to the effort to persuade among peers. persuade adults: Adults professors persuade professors; children persuade other children, but it is not a level playing field when adults with their superior intelligence and their accumulated knowledge gained by years of education experience persuade and children. That's how incest, child molestation, and other forms of the abuse of children take place. Children are to be told by the proper authority what they are to do and then do it.
- 3. Discipline by Rewards: Let's understand, rewards have their proper place in the classroom but not tied in any way to obedience. When a child has done work above and that which was bevond required, a reward is in order. Superior work on a project or assignment by a student may be deserving of a reward; however, a reward for proper behavior, I believe to be out of order. Proper behavior is expected, and reward belittles the requirement. We reward obedience and animals for properly so, but children are not animals. They can know right and wrong and as creatures created in the image and likeness of God should be taught to do what is right without a reward.
- 4. Discipline bv threats. force, or cruelty is obviously not a Christian concept and should always be avoided. Only crude and abusive persons

would consider this a choice, as 3 only harm to the child could be § the outcome.

> 5. Discipline by Peer Pressure § might work in some situations when a child might be affected § by the behavior of another child or group of children that he or she might desire to be a part of; \$ however, on most occasions \$ peer pressure is a blight, \$ because it is very often used to § entice a child toward wrongdoing rather than right.

The Secret to "Voice Obedience"

Voice Obedience is the only scriptural obedience that I can § find in the Scriptures. The rod is the only instrument given in Scripture for the purpose of training the child in obedience. A "rod" is a growth or shoot § sprouting from a shrub or stump of a tree, and it is obvious that in today's climate only parents can use it, and } they must do it early. Parents should always work for voice Children will very obedience. quickly learn that behind your? voice commands there is the § power to bring pain. The beauty \$ of the "rod" is that it comes in \{\} all sizes; very small, short, and limber for the younger ones, and larger, yet limber, for older ones. Used properly the rod "switch" can be put aside for § most children at a young age, X and voice commands are all that § is required. This kind of "voice } obedience" training makes life at home and school enjoyable for § all, the children, the parents, § and \$ the teachers and administrators.

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


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
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

to warn against any teaching that would make Him less precious or cast reflection upon His finished redemptive work and the all-sufficiency of His present service as our great high Priest and Advocate.

Every system of teaching can be judged by what it sets forth as to these fundamental truths of the faith. "What think ye of Christ?" is still the true test of every creed. The Christ of the Bible is certainly not the Christ of any false "-ism." Each of the cults has its hideous caricature of our lovely Lord.

Let us who have been redeemed at the cost of His precious blood be "good soldiers of Jesus Christ." As the battle against the forces of evil waxes ever more hot, we have need for God-given valour. There is constant temptation to compromise. "Let us go forth therefore unto Him without the camp, bearing His reproach." It is always right to stand firmly for what God has revealed concerning His blessed Son's person and work. The "father of lies" deals in half-truths and specializes in most subtle fallacies concerning the Lord Jesus, our sole and sufficient Savior.

Error is like leaven of which we read, "A little leaven leaveneth the whole lump." Truth mixed with error is equivalent to all error, except that it is more innocent looking and, therefore, more dangerous. God hates such a mixture! Any error, or any truth-and-error mixture, calls for definite exposure and repudiation. To condone such is to be unfaithful to God and His Word and treacherous to imperilled souls for whom Christ died.

Exposing error is most unpopular work. But from every true standpoint it is worthwhile work. To our Savior, it means that He receives from us, His blood-bought ones, the loyalty that is His due. To ourselves, if we consider "the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt," it ensures future reward, a thousand-fold. And to souls "caught in the snare of the fowler"—how many of them God only knows—it may mean light and life, abundant and everlasting. Ω

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The Heart

God's one condition is that you give in faith according as you purpose in your heart.
