"Lies and Illusions That Destroy the Church"

Recently in a sound Christian publication, I read a quote by Horace Mann. The quote was very good, and although I am not a disciple of Horace Mann, as I am sure this particular publication is not either, when someone speaks the truth, we can appreciate it.

In the March 2005 issue of *Christianity Today*, I ran across an article which was an interview of Eugene Peterson, an author and former pastor, by Mark Galli, the Managing Editor of *Christianity Today*. I certainly do not know anything about either of these men, although I assume by their association with this particular magazine that they are in the Neo-evangelical camp. The excerpted quotes I present in this article by no means suggest that I endorse Eugene Peterson; however, I believe he nails down some of the serious problems in Neo-Evangelicalism and Fundamentalism as well. The title of the article is "Spirituality For All the Wrong Reasons" and it talks about "lies and illusions that destroy the Church."



TO BE ACCREDITED OR NOT TO BE ACCREDITED: That Is The Question

Definitions

The word accreditation is one of those words or ideas that is given different definitions depending upon who is using the word. It has been bantered about for the last forty to fifty years among those of us involved in the Christian school movement. Everyone seems to have a different take on it, especially those struggling with the issue within their own ministry. You may put your own particular twist to the term, depending upon whether you endorse or deny the practice; however, we must deliberations with the understandings of the term, accreditation, or we certainly will accomplish nothing.

The 1828 Webster's Dictionary definition of the word: Accredit, v.t.: To give authority or reputation.

Webster's New World Dictionary. Accredit, v.t.: To bring into credit or favor; to authorize; give credentials to; to certify as meeting certain set standards. SYN. Authorize.

No Change

Comparing the definitions from the one hundred seventy-seven year old Noah Webster's 1828 Dictionary with the modern Webster's New World Dictionary makes it obvious that the etymology of the word accredit has not changed in the least over ? the years.

Authority

The word that makes all Fundamentalists perk up 🌡 their ears is *Authority* or *Authorize*. We as strict? Fundamentalists don't cater to the idea that any power or authority can interfere or impede our ministry. Our authority is the Word of God, and we are jealous to maintain its control over our life and

and tested by revelation, by the Scriptures. We've got a pretty good vocabulary and syntax, and we'd better start paying attention to it because the way we grab words here and there to appeal to unbelievers is not very good.

This corruption of the word spirituality even in Christian circles – does it have something to do with the New Age movement?

The New Age stuff is old age. It's been around for a long time. It's a cheap shortcut to--I guess we have to use the word --spirituality. It avoids the ordinary, the everyday, the physical, the material. It's a form of Gnosticism, and it has a terrific appeal because it's a spirituality that doesn't have anything to do with doing the dishes or changing diapers or going to work. There's not much integration with work, people, sin, trouble, inconvenience.

I've been a pastor most of my life, for some 45 years. Ilove doing this. But to tell you the truth, the people who give me the most distress are those who come asking, "Pastor, how can I be spiritual?" Forget about being spiritual. How about loving your husband? Now that's a good place to start. But that's not what they're interested in. How about learning to love your kids, accept them the way they are?

2. You make spirituality sound so mundane.

I don't want to suggest that those of us who are following Jesus don't have any fun, that there's no joy, no exuberance, no ecstasy. They're just not what the consumer thinks they are. When we advertise the gospel in terms of the world's values, we lie to people. We lie to them, because this is a new life. It involves following Jesus. It involves the Cross. It involves death, an acceptable sacrifice. We give up our lives.

The Gospel of Mark is so graphic this way. The first half of the Gospel is Jesus showing people how to live. He's healing everybody. Then right in the middle, He shifts. He starts showing people how to die: "Now that you've got a life, I'm going to show you how to give it That's the whole spiritual life. It's learning how

to die. And as you learn how to die, you start losing all your illusions, and you start being capable now of true intimacy and love.

It involves a kind of learned passivity, so that our primary mode of relationship is receiving, submitting, instead of giving and getting and doing. We don't do that very well. We're trained to be assertive, to get, to apply, or to consume and to perform.

3. Repentance, dying to self, submission these are not very attractive hooks to draw people into the faith.

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Proverb Practicals

Proverbs 6:16-19, These six things doth the LORD hate: yea, seven are an abomination unto him: A proud look, a lying tongue, and hands that shed innocent blood, An heart that deviseth wicked imaginations, feet that be swift in running to mischief, A false witness that speaketh lies, and he that soweth discord among brethren.

True Faith

This proverb clearly teaches that God hates as well as loves. True faith will move you to hate the same things that God hates. The Bible tells us in other passages that those who are wise will hate the things that God hates. God has given us the rod to impress our children of the awfulness of sin and to convince them of our hatred for sin, evil and wickedness. We demonstrate hate for sin and all things that will corrupt our children when we truly love our children. Hate is an attribute of God because God is love! Every sin is hateful to God, for sin tears down but love builds up.

God reveals to us seven things He hates so intensely that He turns up the heat to make His hatred become abomination. God wants us to know what He extremely hates so it moves us to hate the same things.

Corrupt Look

The first abomination of God is a proud look. Our generation is a generation of lofty eyes, eyes that are lifted up. The proud look is the look of confidence in one's own pureness and a disdain upon others who do not measure up. It is a look that looks on the surface but refuses to look upon the heart. A proud look is a vision of one's self based

upon one's own standards and not God's standards. A proud look is an abomination to God because the one with a proud look refuses to look at His Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, Who

brings all things to light and destroys the proud look.

The tongue is but

a rudder of the

heart.

Corrupt Tongue

Secondly, God hates a lying tongue, and we must likewise hate a lying tongue. We must know that the tongue is but a rudder of the heart. There is no such thing as a *slip of the tongue*, as the tongue only follows the orders of the helmsman of the heart. The tongue responds perfectly to the instructions from the heart, for the heart is the master and the tongue but the slave.

God loves simplicity of truth. The lying tongue hates simplicity and loves, complexity, loving God is a God of falsehood, loving love but because of exaggeration, loving the coloring of stories, loving man's sin. He is perversion, and loving to also a God of hate. produce or encourage wrong impressions. It loves to be careless about truth, loving generalities instead of the specific. God has barred the gates of Heaven against all liars, for none of them are His people.

Corrupt Hands

Thirdly, God hates hands that shed innocent blood, and we must likewise hate those bloody hands. God hated the hands of Cain as they shed innocent blood. He hated the hands of Judas, the hands of the

Pharisees, and the generation of vipers that crucified His Son. Today, He hates the hands of abortionists, the hands of the murderers and those who care not but for themselves and not for the innocent and helpless.

He hates the hands of those who distort His image, those who shed innocent blood.

Corrupt Mind

Fourthly, He hates the heart that devises wicked imaginations, the heart that thinks of new ideas, new contrivances for sin. This is the heart that has become the habitation of devils, the cage of every unclean and hateful bird. This is the heart that has conquered its God-given conscience.

Corrupt Feet

This is the heart that God mentions as His fifth abomination, the heart that wants to be first in line to perform mischief. This is the heart that directs feet to activities that will find themselves in slippery places.

Corrupt Witness

The sixth hatred of God involves the false witness who has no bright object on which to focus his life. He is a false witness because he has no assurance of that which he speaks. He can only be a false witness because he has never witnessed the saving power of Jesus Christ in his life. God hates the false preacher, the apostate, the evolutionist who all speak lies. Their ways, not being founded upon the rock of Jesus Christ, are not established.

Corrupt Unity

And lastly, God hates the man that sows discord among the brethren, for God highly values unity among His people. He desires that we be of one mind and one mouth, in one accord and in one spirit in the same love.

God hates those who disturb this (Continued on page 12)

I think the minute you put the issue that way you're in trouble. Because then we join the consumer world, and everything then becomes product designed to give you something. We don't need something more. We don't need something better. We're after life. We're learning how to live.

I think people are fed up with consumer approaches, even though they're addicted to them. But if we cast the evangel in terms of benefits, we're setting people up for disappointment. We're telling them lies.

This is not the way our Scriptures are written. This is not the way Jesus came among us. It's not the way Paul preached. Where do we get all this stuff? We have a textbook. We have these Scriptures and most of the time they're saying, "You're going the wrong way. Turn around. The culture is poisoning."

Do we realize how almost exactly the Baal culture of Canaan is reproduced in American church culture? Baal religion is about what makes you feel good. Baal worship is a total immersion in what I can get out of it. And of course, it was incredibly successful. The Baal priests could gather crowds that outnumbered followers of Yahweh 20 to I. There was sex, there was excitement, there was music, there was ecstasy, there was dance. "We got girls over here, friends. We got statues, girls, and festivals." This was great stuff. And what did the Hebrews have to offer in response? The Word.

4. Still the one big hook or benefit to Christian faith is salvation, no? "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and you will be saved." Is this not something we can use to legitimately attract listeners?

It's the biggest word we havesalvation, being saved. We are saved from a way of life in which there was no resurrection. And we're being saved from ourselves. One way to define spiritual life is getting so tired and fed up with yourself you go on to something better, which is following Jesus.

But the minute we start advertising the faith in terms of benefits, we're just exacerbating the self problem. "With Christ, you're better, stronger, more likeable, you enjoy some ecstasy." But it's just more self. Instead, we want to get people bored with themselves so they can start looking at Jesus.

We've all met a certain type of spiritual person. She's a wonderful person. She loves the Lord. She prays and reads the Bible all the time. But all she thinks about is herself. She's not a selfish person. But she's always at the center of everything she's doing. "How can I witness better? How can I take care of this person's problem better?" It's me, me, me disguised in a way that is difficult to see because her spiritual talk disarms us.

Since the Reformation, though, we've championed the idea that the church can be reformed.

Hasn't happened. I'm for always reforming, but to think that we can get a church that's reformed is just silliness.

I think the besetting sin of pastors, maybe especially evangelical pastors, is impatience. We have a goal. We have a mission. We're going to save the world. We're going to evangelize everybody, and we're going to do all this good stuff and fill our churches. This is wonderful. All the goals are right. But this is slow, slow work, this soul work, this bringing people into a life of obedience and love and joy before God.

And we get impatient and start taking shortcuts and use any means available. We talk about benefits.

heaven right now. In my estimation their claims are based upon an entirely false view of atonement for sin.

Have we forgotten the Papal claim that he is the "Vicar (Substitute) of Christ" here upon the earth? Yet the Roman Catholic religion is considered by most governments, Dr. Billy I Graham, and the news media to be a "Christian" faith. The Roman Catholic Church, however, has a Satanicinspired false view of the atonement of Jesus Christ and, therefore, can make no claim to be Christian. Increasingly the walls are being broken down that separate truth from error. This process of accommodation is not new but it has I reached its climax in the rise of religious ecumenism with its dishonest I terminology.

I found this statement during college days by an unnamed source. It gives some clarity and focus to our theme. "The best measure of the rightness of any religious belief system is given by its conception of sin, the cure for sin, and the authority which is the basis for the cure." When you put the religions of this world to this simple three-point test you find that they are in error, for the standard of the Word of God has been rejected. My friend, it all boils down to the atonement of Jesus Christ in our behalf.

What do we mean by the atonement?

In order to understand the atonement we must view it from both the Old and New Testaments. The Hebrew word for atonement is kaphar – meaning to cover over so as not to be seen, to make atonement. The commandments given to the priests concerning atonement are found in

PREACH REPENTANCE

The following statement by B. H. Carroll, is from Repentance and Remission of Sins. 1889: "The leaves preacher who out repentance commits as grave a sin as the one who leaves out faith. I mean he must preach repentance iust as often, and with as much emphasis, and to as many people as he preaches faith. To omit repentance, to ignore it, to depreciate it, is rebellion and treason. Mark its relative importance: You may make a mistake about baptism and be saved, for baptism is not essential to salvation...but 'Except ve repent ye shall all likewise perish.' So said the Master Himself. Repentance is a preparatory work. For thus saith the Lord: 'Break up your fallow ground and sow not among thorns.' No harvest can be gathered from an unplowed field. The fallow ground needs to be broken up. ... Whoever starts this side of repentance makes a false beginning which vitiates his whole Christian profession. When true repentance was preached and emphasized, there were not so many nominal professors

TO LEAVE OUT OR religion. NO I MINIMIZE REPENTANCE, MATTER WHAT SORT OF A FAITH YOU PREACH, IS TO PREPARE A GENERATION OF PREPARE A GENERATION OF PROFESSORS WHO ARE SUCH IN NAME ONLY. I give it as my deliberate conviction, founded on twenty-five years of ministerial observation, that the Christian profession of today owes its lack of vital godliness, its want of practical piety, its absence from the prayer meeting, its miserable semblance of missionary life, very largely to the fact that old-fashioned repentance is so little preached. You can't put a big house on a little foundation. And no small part of such preaching comes from a class of modern evangelists who desiring more for their own glory to count a great number of converts than to lay deep foundations, reduce the conditions of salvation by one-half and make the other half but some intellectual trick of the mind rather than a radical spiritual change of the heart."

Once a year the high priest entered the Holy of Holies to make atonement for the holv sanctuary, tabernacle of the congregation, the priests, and the congregation of Israel. The purpose of the atonement as Leviticus 16:30 "to make savs. was atonement for you, to cleanse you, that ye may be clean from all your sins before the Lord." This "covering" had to be repeated each and every year. This was done to shield the Israelites from the wrath and judgment of God until the perfect sacrifice (Christ) was made. The Old Testament Scriptures are full of references to atonement and represent the principle of "covering" that is required for the sinner. In the New Testament, the Blood of Christ outpoured is the covering of the sinner. This covering shields the believer from the wrath and judgment of God permanently. This is the heart of the atonement. To be "under the blood" is to be in a place of complete security. Although the word atonement in the New Testament is only found once, it is clearly implied in the word covered in Romans 4:7 and also in the New Testament terms propitiation and reconciliation. Hebrews 9:5 makes reference to the "Mercy-seat" which was the "covering" of the Ark of the Covenant. These words describe the means in and through which the Lord Jesus Christ secured our atonement by the shedding of His precious blood in a vicarious act by which God can now justify sinners who believe on His

There are four important things to keep in mind as we

name.

consider the Atonement:

- 1) The only authority in the world on the subject of atonement is the Scriptures.
- 2) The proper interpretation of the atonement depends upon an authoritative view of the nature and character of God as set forth in the Scriptures.
- 3) The atonement of Christ cannot be understood apart from the deity and sinlessness of Christ as set forth in the Scriptures.
- 4) The conception and nature of sin must be understood from the authority of the Scriptures in order to understand the atonement of Christ.

Let us examine these briefly.

The Authority that is the Basis for the Cure

Those who accept the Bible as the Word of God interpret the atonement in its full context as given in the Old and New Testaments. In our day, men claim the right of private interpretation, the right of symbolic interpretation, the right to interpret Scripture according to their own preconceived ideas. This is lawlessness. It seeks the destruction of all normal and literal meaning.

Pope John Paul II died on Saturday, April 2, 2005. The Pope's atonement was based upon the authority of the Roman ! the ! Catholic Church, not authority of Christ and His blessed Word. The Pope claimed I to be the Vicar of Christ. It is my belief that he slipped from the bonds of this earth into a ! Devil's Hell. When it comes to the matter of the atonement, there is no room for private interpretation. If you button

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ministry. We must guard sacredly our liberty to speak and do as the Word directs. Nothing is more important than that to our own faith and the integrity of our ministry. Closing our doors is a possibility; however, compromise must not be. We cannot oppose the apostasy of these last days from a weakened position. Our determination is not to cut corners to seek love, yet love is more enticing than militancy, and determination has been known to weaken.

TWO ROADS

In the matter of accreditation, there are essentially two possibilities, two roads, one of which a ministry must choose.

Self-Accreditation

This has been the road to which some schools have adhered. To travel this way, the product of your ministry must be superb: of the highest quality. Graduates are to be so well prepared that their services are greatly desired, even though the word accredited may not be on their diploma. **Those** businesses or institutions that insist upon an accredited diploma or teacher's certificate probably would not be the place these graduates would want to serve; however, it is the position of those who subscribe to self-accreditation that most businesses are looking for those who can do the job, with or without accreditation. Accreditation may give an institution more graduates, but not necessarily better graduates.

Sectarian Accreditation

This route eventually will likely lead to a religious organization controlling many of your decisions. Religion has been the curse of history, and even though the accrediting organization claims to be Christian, their desire for power and control will become obvious after a while, even if they claim that their control is for the purpose of making the These accrediting State happy. associations generally make it clear in their opening presentation that they have the endorsement of the state in which they operate, or even better they are recognized by the United States Dept. of Education. Pressure is usually the thing that moves an institution from the ranks of the self-approved to approval of a larger realm. The question

LOOK ME IN THE EYE!

The hearing ear, and the seeing eye, the Lord hath made both of them (Proverbs 20:12).

Your eyes have been called the window to your soul. By looking another person in the eye, you can detect sorrow, happiness, sadness, joy, attitude, and a multitude of other emotions. Our eyes allow us to "read" other people. As teachers, we must maintain eye contact with our pupils while we are teaching so that we can also "read" our students. We can easily catch a puzzled look or a confused expression on our students' faces when we are maintaining direct eye contact. Some students have described certain teachers as having "eyes in the back of their head." These all-seeing teachers have developed this special talent by being aware of what is going on in every corner of their classroom.

Eye Contact Essential

Learning to keep eye contact with another person may be difficult for some; however, when you are trying to get your point across or let others know that you are truly concerned about something, it is serious business. Teachers need to practice eye control if it does not come naturally. Looking steadfastly into a mirror can help you develop eye contact. The mirror can also be used to help you

develop your "teacher look" that helps maintain order and discipline. "A king that sitteth in the throne of judgment scattereth away all evil with his eyes" (Proverbs 20:8).

Eve Contact Impact

Professionals are more likely to trust people who will look them squarely in the eye while they are making a business deal. Direct eye contact lets others know that you are confident and sure of your beliefs and subject matter. Looking at the floor or shifting your eyes toward the ceiling causes one to appear to be shiftless and untrustworthy. Even the youngest students can "read" their teacher's confidence, and they will take you more

seriously when you use eye contact in your classroom.

Making eye contact not only shows confidence, but it also is an important way to show respect. Our students need to be taught to focus their attention on the teacher or anyone else who is talking to them. Daydreaming will be more difficult for our students if they are required to maintain eye contact with the teacher. At the same time, a good way for our students to learn eye contact with others is to follow the example that we set. When the children in our class see us treat all members of the staff – cafeteria workers, secretaries, custodians, etc – directly and with respect, they will more likely follow our lead and learn to show respect to others.

Eye Contact Result

Eye contact must be maintained in a classroom because it sets the tone for academics as well as discipline. Our students need to develop "people skills," exhibit confidence and trust, and also learn to show respect by daily practicing this important skill. God promised that He would not only "instruct" and "teach" but would also "guide thee with mine eye" (Psalm 32:8).



(Continued from page 4—Lies and Illusions) We manipulate people. We bully them. We use language that is just incredibly impersonalbullying language, manipulative language.

One doesn't normally think of churches as bullying.

Whenever guilt is used as a tool to get people to do anything -good, bad, indifferent - it's And then there's bullying. manipulative language -- to talk people into programs, to get them involved, usually by promising them something.

I have a friend who is an expert at this sort of thing. He's always saying, "You've got to identify people's felt needs. Then you construct a program to meet the felt needs." It's pretty easy to manipulate people. We're so used to being manipulated by the image industry, the publicity industry, and the politicians that we hardly know we're being manipulated.

This impatience to leave the methods of Jesus in order to get the work of Jesus done is what destroys spirituality, because we're using a non-biblical, non-Jesus way to do what Jesus did. That's why spirituality is in such a mess as it is today.

But many pastors see people suffering in bad marriages, with drug addiction, with greed. And so they rightly want to help them now, by whatever method will work.

Yes, except something backfires on you when you're impatient. How do we meet the need? Do we do it in Jesus' way or do we do it the Wal-Mart way?

Spirituality is not about ends or benefits or things; it's about means. It's about how you do this. How do you live in reality?

So, how do you help all these people? The needs are huge. Well, you do it the way Jesus did it. You do it one at a time. You can't do gospel work, kingdom work in an impersonal way.

We live in the Trinity. Everything we do has to be in the context of the Trinity, which means personally, relationally. The minute you start doing impersonally, things functionally, mass oriented, you deny the gospel. Yet that's all we do. Jesus is the Truth and the Life, but first he's the Way. We can't do Jesus' work in the Devil's way.

I get exercised about this because many pastors getting castrated by these methodologies, which impersonal. There's no relationship to them. And so they become performance oriented and successful. pretty easy in our culture, at least if you're tall and have a big smile. And they lose their soul.

We appreciate your paper which is ☑ like a "voice crying out in the wilderness." Keep up the good work.



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
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Stars of the Morning

An Authoritative View of the **Nature and Character of God**

Men have a tendency to think of God wrongly as to His nature and character. For instance, moral relations between man and God are not the same as moral relations between man and man. Men may forgive a friend for an offense, but they do not and cannot forgive the friend's sin. When any one has sinned against us we may put aside our personal feelings and resentment; however, we cannot do more than that, forgive sin. we cannot The sin remains, and although we may not allow it to influence our conduct towards our friend, he still retains his sin.

In the forgiveness of God, it is the sin itself which is done away with. The burden is lifted from the life, the conscience is cleansed, and transgression is removed, for the forgiveness of God transcends the forgiveness of man. Those who would say that God should forgive as man forgives disregard the difference in relationship and the difference in the character of the forgiver and the forgiveness given.

Another example of this important distinction is that ends in Christian theology sinful man is inclined to with the holiness of God. emphasize love at the expense of holiness and

righteousness. In the process of emphasizing love at the expense of holiness, the character of God is depreciated. Sin is a transgression not simply against a loving God but against a Holy God. Everything begins and ends in Christian theology with the holiness of God. In the checks and balances system of God, purity is the final check. It is important that we have a right view of the nature and

character of God if we are to interpret the atonement properly.

The Deity and Sinlessness of Christ

"Which of you John 8:46, convinceth me of sin? And if I say the truth, why do ve not believe me?"

II Cor. 5:21, "For he hath made him to be sin for us, who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in him."

Hebrews 4:15, "For we have not an high priest, which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities: but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin."

It is an essential truth in the New Testament view of the atonement that the substitutionary sacrifice for the sin of mankind be without blemish and without spot and free from all sin. If He is not free from all sin, then He cannot be an adequate substitute or an atoning sacrifice for another. He dies for his own sins.

It is the deity of Christ that gives the atonement value. "For God so loved the world that he gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). Deity was robed in flesh to make atonement for the sin of the world. It is "God with

> us" (Matthew 1:12) and the "Word m a d eflesh" (John 1:14) that makes the atonement understandable. Together they stand; separated they fall. If

one is untrue, then the other is untrue.

The Conception and Nature of Sin Must Be Understood

Again, "The best measure of the rightness of any religious belief system is given by its conception of sin, the cure for sin, and the authority which is the basis for the cure."

All forms of modernism and liberalism have promoted evolutionary thought. They believe that man is the product of his environment and, therefore, is not responsible for his The theory of evolution actions. promoted in our public schools and universities is incompatible with the doctrine of the atonement, and it is not surprising that these entities have rejected the atonement. They do not I believe that man has a sin nature and, therefore, he has no need for atonement for sin. By interpreting the Scriptures I symbolically, they achieve their attempt to wed their evolutionary ideas of the origin of man with a distorted view of sin. The result is a twisted and perverted conception and nature of sin.

The Principles Underlying the Atonement

- 1) Sin must be covered. The blood of 1 Christ outpoured is the covering of the sinner. To be under the blood is to be in a place of complete security from the wrath of God.
- 2) Sin must be paid for. Christ accomplished reconciliation through the payment of a penalty on Calvary. Romans 5:11, "And not only so, but we also joy in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom we have now th e atonement received (reconciliation)."
- 3) The sinner must have a perfect substitute who is without sin. Isaiah 53:5, "But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was bruised for our iniquities: the chastisement of our peace was upon him; and with his stripes we are healed." Substitution, the vicarious atonement for man's sin; this is what the Bible teaches. This is the sinner's only plea.
