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CONCERNING MIRACLES

The word "miracle" is thrown around rather loosely by most people today, not just the people of the world, but also by many professed Christians. The word has become so generic in its usage that a miracle has come to mean whatever the one who uses the word desires that it mean. Let's step back and take a look at the Biblical use of the word.

Definition

Miracle (Webster's 1828 Dictionary): "In theology...A deviation from the known laws of

nature; a supernatural event." In the secular use, a miracle is simply a wonder or a wonderful thing. The problem is that many professed believers use this secular definition and refer to most any wonder as a miracle. In our usage here in this article, we will use only the Biblical usage, which teaches that a miracle is a supernatural event.

Israel and Miracles

Miracles, or supernatural signs as they are often called especially

A FATAL ATTITUDE

Matthew 24:38, 39, 42, 44, 48-51 - For as in the days that were before the flood they were eating and drinking, marrying and giving in marriage, until the day that Noe entered into the ark, And knew not until the flood came, and took them all away; so shall also the coming of the Son of man be.... Watch therefore: for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come... Hymn Singing in Crisis

'There is a distinct relationship between a knowledge of our heritage in hymnody and better singing in our churches." This statement was made in the preface of the 1957 edition of the Worship and Service Hymnal produced by the Hope Publishing Company. These hymn editors of yesteryear recognized then what has been forgotten by so many now. hymn heritage enhances congregational singing. In my opinion, the tripe that is being offered today is destroying congregational hymn singing because there is no connection to the This disconnect is vividly evident because solid Biblical doctrine is being watered down in the new church music of today.

No Crusade for the Tried and True

One of the problems as I see it is that there are few preachers and church music leaders crusading for the old hymns of the faith. Pastor John Ashbrook of the Ohio Bible Fellowship has well said, "You cannot maintain a position without crusading for it." The crusade today is for change. The hue and cry of music leadership today is "We want new songs." This begs the question, "WHY?" Are we tired of the old hymns? There are few who are crusading to keep the quality hymns of the past. It seems that many are willing to sacrifice the tried and true for that which is popular to keep "tares" happy in the pew.

A Changed View of the Purpose of Hymns

The view of the use and purpose of hymns in the church has changed over the years. In the past, the hymnbook was used for public worship as well as private devotion. The attitude prevalent was, "Give diligence that thy heart believes what thy voice sings, and that thy life demonstrates what thy heart believes." The personal hymnbook gave precious opportunity for the

children of God to share and to sing the sublime truths of God's eternal greatness, His goodness, His grace, His sovereignty, His will, and the Savior's mighty love. It was considered a spiritual treasury of devotion, aspiration, comfort and assurance. Now it is being replaced and discarded in favor of big screens that project words to be sung *in a moment in time* with little contemplation beyond that moment. How views have changed!

Presentation of Biblical Truth in Song

One hymn editor of the past wrote, "God gave us His holy Word in the form of our Bible. Man has compiled a book to be a companion to the holy Word, namely the hymnbook. The Bible is God's expression to man, while the hymnbook is man's

expression to God. The Bible presents truths and doctrines, and the hymnbook helps translate them to the masses. Good church music is not an end in itself. It is a means to the end that the lost may be saved and the redeemed my be brought closer to God."

I am Your Hymnbook

I close with this writing found in the flyleaf of the 1953 edition of the Tabernacle Hymns Number Five:.

"Next to the Bible, I should be your most treasured book.

Hold me in your hand on Sunday when you prepare to sing.

Let your heart listen to what has been enshrined within me. Hear the songs and the triumphant words of the martyrs dying for a faith the same as yours. Give heed to the prayers of devout men who have found the heart of God. Follow the missionaries of the Cross on their way to the ends of the earth. Listen to the great minds of the Church as they share with you the deep mysteries of the plan and purpose of the eternal God. Sit at the feet of the musicians and the poets, of the saints and the redeemed in all lands and times, of all those who have seen the hunger in the heart unsatisfied except through song. All these I have treasured.....for you.

bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, Teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world; Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ."

My Lord Delayeth His Coming

The Blessed Hope is purifying hope, as it is a constant reminder of our responsibilities and hope as members of Christ's

body. The neglect of the preaching and teaching of this most glorious truth leads weakness, slackness, and sin, as we see in the life of the unjust steward noted above.

Reasons for Failure

- 1. The first reason the Blessed Hope is not preached today is that the pursuit of purity is not the purpose of most of our churches today.
- 2. The second reason is that the Blessed Hope appeals only to true

believers, of which, I'm afraid, there are very few in so many of our churches.

3. The third reason is that the preaching of the Blessed Hope would create a back door revival, and those are not in vogue today. Churches today have largely become social and worldly cultural societies dealing with the "felt needs" of the congregation. Tickling ears and making folks feel good about themselves is what the average church program is all about.

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Proverb Practicals

Prov 26:18,19, As a mad man who casteth firebrands, arrows, and death, So is the man that deceiveth his neighbour, and saith, Am not I in sport?

When I was a boy we played a game where we flipped a knife near the foot of another player who was required to move his foot nearest the knife, to the location of the knife, while keeping his other foot stationary. The first one to fall would be the loser. During the 4th of July festivities we took pleasure throwing firecrackers at the feet of our playmates to see how fast they could dance.

These acts do not measure up to the acts of madmen but they are the apprentice grounds for the job, for mad men start here. These acts are not meant to do harm but on occasion they do great harm.

The boy jumps away from a firecracker and into the explosion of another firecracker which blows up near his eye, causing permanent damage. The knife bounces off a hard object and stabs the leg of the player. These exhibit the law of unintended consequences.

What about the young fellows who stole the stop sign for a lark resulting in several deaths of innocent drivers? What about young people who sling a rock through a man's window not thinking that the house owner may believe it was a gunshot that caused a bullet to enter his house. Did they consider the possibility

of that house owner thinking the lives of his family were at risk. Did they consider that one of their own would be dead a few minutes after their ill-considered prank?

What about the hazing incidents in colleges and fraternities that end so tragically? What about the stupid challenges to drink vast

amounts of alcohol in order to fit in? These are all unplanned results of events that took place because of tricks, horseplay, or pranks. You had better be careful when you choose to indulge in such things, for there may be results that bear no resemblance to that which was planned!

In Eph 5:4, Paul cautions us in this when he wrote: Neither filthiness, nor foolish talking, nor jesting, which are not convenient: but rather giving of thanks.

He called what we have described, "jesting which is not convenient," jesting in the sense of a well turned phrase or witticism or act. Paul admonished us to let jesting which is not proper to "not be

once named among you, as becometh saints."


Those who do these things are false friends, deceivers who pretend to love but bring injury instead. They are those who elevate themselves on the back of another by jesting or practical joking!

Solomon says the same thing in our proverb when he describes one who deceives his neighbor and then says, "Oh, I was just kidding; I was just playing." Solomon asks us to picture a mad man who throws about flashes of fire, sharp instruments like knives and arrows, that can cause injury or even death.

This is the image we are told to carry with us as we relate to those around us. We are not, in the framework of jesting, to bring our neighbors, our friends, to a place of scorn. We are not by jesting, which is not proper, to say something that will result in friction, strife, contention, or embarrassment. Many times we allow the evil of our heart to reveal itself under the cloak of jesting.

On many occasions, while attempting to be witty, we cause hurt and pain to friends and neighbors. We think it more important to be thought of as witty, as one who can speak a

Truth could not be truth in this world if it were not a warning thing, and we should at once suspect that it were not true if error were friends with it. The spotless purity of truth must always be at war with the blackness of heresy and lies. I say again, it would cast a suspicion upon its 🛛 own nature; we should feel at once that it was not true, if it were not at enmity with the false. And so at this present time, the church of Christ, being in herself the only incarnation of truth left in this world, must be at war with error of every kind and shape; or if she were not, we should at once conclude that she was not herself the church of the living God. It is but a rule of nature that holiness must be at enmity with sin. That would be but a mock purity, which could lie side by side with

"Do you believe you are a sinner?"

"Yes."

"Do you believe Christ died for sinners?"

"Yes."

"Will you receive Him as your Saviour?"

"Yes."

"Then you are saved!"

"I am?"

"Yes, the Bible says you are saved."

At first blush the method and the message might seem above criticism. But on closer study we are forced to have second thoughts and to conclude that we have oversimplified the gospel.

The first fatal flaw is the missing emphasis on repentance. There can be no true conversion without conviction of sin. It is one thing to agree that I am a sinner; it

is quite another thing to experience the convicting ministry of the Holy Spirit in my life. Unless I have a Spirit-wrought consciousness of my utterly lost condition, I can never exercise saving faith. It is useless to tell

It is one thing to agree that I am a sinner; it is quite another thing to experience the convicting ministry of the Holy Spirit.

unconvicted sinners to believe on Jesus-that message is only for those who know they are lost. We sugar-coat the gospel when we deemphasize man's fallen condition. With that kind of a watered-down message, people receive the Word with joy instead of with deep contrition. They do not have deep roots, and though they might endure for a while, they soon give up all profession when persecution or trouble comes (Matthew 13:21). We have forgotten that the message is repentance toward God as well as faith in our Lord Jesus Christ.

A second serious omission is a missing emphasis on the Lordship of Christ. A light, jovial mental assent that Jesus is Saviour misses the point. Jesus is first Lord, then Saviour. The New Testament always places His Lordship before His Saviourhood. Do we present the full implications of His Lordship to people? He always

A third defect in our message is our tendency to keep the terms of discipleship hidden until a decision has been made for Jesus. Our Lord never did this. The message He preached included the cross as well

(Continued from page 6—Evangelical Dilemma) as the crown. "He never hid His scars to win disciples." He revealed the worst along with the best, then told His listeners to count the cost. We popularize the message and promise fun.

The result of all this is that we have people believing without knowing what they believe. In many cases they have no doctrinal basis for their decision. They do not know the implications of commitment to Christ. They have never experienced the mysterious, miraculous work of the Holy Spirit in regeneration.

And of course we have others who are talked into a profession because o f the slick salesmanship techniques of the soul-winner. Or some who want to please the affable, personable young man with the winning smile. And some who only want to get rid of this religious interloper who has intruded on their privacy. Satan laughs when these conversions are triumphantly announced on earth.

I would like to raise several questions that might lead us to some changes in our strategy of evangelism.

First of all, can we generally expect people to make an intelligent commitment to Christ the first time they hear the gospel? Certainly there is the exceptional case where a person has already been prepared by the Holy Spirit. But generally speaking, the process involves sowing the seed, watering it, then sometime later reaping the harvest. In our mania for instant conversion, we have forgotten that conception, gestation, and

birth do not occur on the same day.

A second question: can a capsule presentation of the gospel really do justice to so great a message? As one who has written several gospel tracts, I confess to a certain sense of misgiving in even attempting to condense the good news into four small pages. Would we not be wiser to give people the full presentation as it is found in the Gospels, or in the New Testament?

Thirdly, is all this pressure for decisions really scriptural? Where in the New Testament were people pressured into making a profession? We justify our practice by saying that if only one out of ten is genuine, it is worth it. But what about the other nine—disillusioned, bitter, perhaps deceived enroute to hell by a false profession.

And I must ask this: is all this boasting about conversions really accurate? You've met the man who solemnly tells you of ten people he contacted that day and all of them were saved. A young doctor testified that every time he goes to a new city, he looks in the phone book for people with his last name. Then he calls them one by one and leads them through the four steps to salvation. Amazingly enough, every one of them opens the door of his heart to Jesus. I don't want to doubt the honesty of people like this, but am I wrong in thinking that they are extremely naïve? Where are all those people who are saved? They cannot be found.

What it all means is that we should seriously re-examine our

well-turned phrase than one who cares about the feelings of others. Embarrassment of others in order to perform a jest and to receive acclaim is like a madman who amuses himself bv threatening those around him with instruments of death. We choose to play with fire at the expense of others!

We certainly ought to be a people with senses of humor. We ought to be a laughing people, a people who enjoy one another and enjoy jesting and joking. But that ought to be proper jesting, jesting that cements friendships instead of separating friends. To be otherwise is to be a deceiver, a friend in name only and not a friend in deed. We

are not to be thought of as a friend when by our jesting we prove ourselves enemies. It is better to have enemies that are open enemies than a so-called friend, who brings wounds that are not the wounds of love but of hate.

Prov 10:23 says: It is as sport to a fool to do mischief: but a man of understanding hath wisdom.

A man of understanding has wisdom even in his jesting. Wisdom guards the door of his lips even in his times of humor and jesting. He dares not push himself up while putting others down. This is what God's heart is in this matter. He thinks that one who does is equal to a madman!
